**FARM REMINDERS**

Culling the ewe flock before breeding to cut out all those not up to standard in size and vigor is a practice found profitable by best Oregon sheep men. Breeding ewes to lamb before they are two years old is found a poor practice. Elimination of the "gunnies" is advised by the experiment station since investigation shows they are rarely profitable.

Contagious abortion is being eradicated in many Oregon dairy herds. One tested and disease free cow shown at the state fair this year by the experiment station was the daughter of a cow that aborted four times as did her mother before. This was an aborted calf at 254 days, yet by being raised away from her ancestors she has remained disease free and given birth to eight normal calves.
