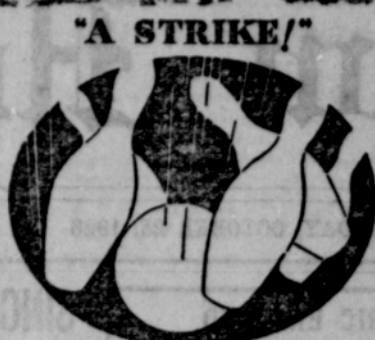
**MISS VERONA HARDY**
