

PAROLES REFUSED IN CENTRALIA CASE

Walla Walla, Wash. — The state prison board, at its session just ended, refused to grant requests for clemency for eight members of the International Workers of the World who have been held in prison for seven years on murder charges growing out of the Armistice day parade killings in Centralia in 1919.

Requests for clemency came from pacifists, socialists and the International Workers of the World as a body, and also David Starr Jordan, internationally known educator. The board has taken similar action each time the requests were made. The men were sentenced to from 25 to 40 years each for murder on April 5, 1920, and entered prison in June, 1921, when the United States supreme court refused their appeal.

American Legion members in the parade asserted the International Workers of the World members fired on them as their parade passed the International Workers of the World hall, and the International Workers of the world declared the hall was attacked and they fired in self-defense.

HOSS SECRETARY OF STATE

Governor Patterson Accepts Kozer's Resignation.

Salem, Or.—Governor Patterson accepted the resignation of Sam A. Kozer, secretary of state, appointed Hal Hoss to fill out Mr. Kozer's unexpired term and then appointed Mr. Kozer state budget director.

Mr. Hoss, who is the republican nominee for secretary of state at the November election, assumed his new duties Monday. He will serve under his appointive commission until January.

Mr. Hoss announced that he has appointed C. N. Laughridge deputy secretary of state. Mr. Laughridge has served in this capacity for the past six years. Tom Raffety, head of the state traffic division, and Carl Gabrielson, in charge of the state motor vehicle division, also will be retained by Mr. Hoss.

The first official act of the new secretary of state was that of signing a warrant in the amount of \$1,609,001.43, covering principal and interest on state highway bonds.

"Flu" Bad in Mackenzie River Region

Prince Rupert, B. C.—Fifteen percent of the native population in some parts of the Mackenzie river region has been wiped out by influenza, Captain Vladimir Perfilief, head of a Philadelphia Academy of Science expedition, declared here after a summer in the arctic. The deaths among the natives run into the hundreds, Captain Perfilief said.
