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**INDUSTRIES MINUS FACILITIES**

The shipment of three full carloads of turkeys from Hermiston last week brought rather forcibly to mind the fact that the Hermiston project is developing an industry of no mean proportions. Another fact was also called to the attention of those who observed the process of shipping—the inadequate warehousing facilities for the proper handling of the birds.

In all probability, future shipments will be of even greater size. With this condition, facilities must be increased, or the shipping point for the turkeys of this and the surrounding communities will no longer be at Hermiston but some nearby town where adequate facilities are available. This loss to Hermiston can be avoided, and will be, if Hermistonians arouse themselves to the realization of just what this industry means to the community and town.

The amount received in actual cash for the turkeys shipped last week is doubly significant when it is regarded in the light of the fact that turkeys have been grown on the project commercially but two or three years. Those three carloads of birds, comprising only one pool of the season, yielded to the growers something over \$25,000 in cash. This turkey proposition, we must keep in mind, represents only one of the several industries which project farmers are developing on an extensive scale. Poultry raising, the production of commercial eggs, vegetables and innumerable other things are to be considered in the general survey.

Would a cold storage plant in this community be a worth while project? We believe it would, and we likewise have a faint suspicion that construction of such a plant, either by local or outside capital, will offset any possibility of Hermiston losing out as a major shipping point for turkeys and other produce.

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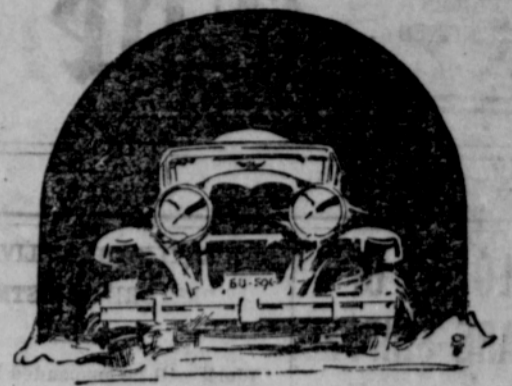
