### OREGON FARMERS FIGHT SERIOUS STOCK LOSSES

Oregon farmers, victims of stock thieves and sheep killing dogs are no longer going to sit idly by while their profits are taken away, judging from the results of two recent conferences on these subjects in which representatives of the state college and other organizations took part.

One conference on the thieving evil resulted in the drafting of two bills regulating the sale and transportation of livestock and carcasses, together with provisions for better enforcement and heavier fines and longer imprisonment for those caught.

Representative sheep owners meeting at the college also drafted a bill intended to make it practically "open season" on all dogs left to run at large at night. Other provisions of the bill would assist in reimbursing farmers for losses which in 10 counties alone last year amounted to more than \$25,000 in sheep killed, not counting injuries and loss from fright.

Kiddle Has Cast Iron Hat  
Salem, Jan. 31—Senator Fred A. Kiddle has a new hat. It is not the kind of hat usually seen on men who come from such counties as Morrow, Umatilla or Union. Neither is it the kind of a hat which loyal Republicans wore during the recent political campaign.
