EGG MARKETING CONFERENCE

producers that they consider the effect upon the net return of their eggs.

The report stated that Eastern Oregon eggs do not have, as a general rule, an enviable reputation, but it went on to say that the situation is not nearly so discouraging as it is sometimes thought to be. While some poultrymen who ship to the Pacific report that they receive as low as 1 or 2 per cent extra grade eggs, others report as high as 67 per cent extra grade over an eight months period. This is evidence that extras can and are being produced.

The general idea expressed in the report and echoed by perhaps a majority of those attending the meeting was that fairly satisfactory marketing conditions exist in eastern Oregon, comparing favorably with conditions in comparable areas of the United States and not calling for any radical changes at the present time.
