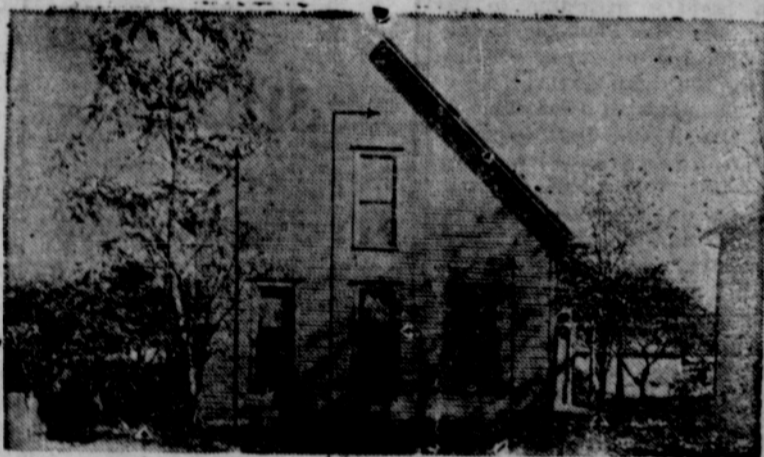

HOME POINTERS

Many housewives find their shortening becomes rancid soon after the container is opened. This can be prevented if the can is kept dry, tightly covered and in a cool place.

Celery may be prepared for use several days or hours before using if washed well, cut in desired lengths and put in jars in a cool place.

Brushing potatoes with a small amount of fat before baking will keep the skins soft.

To slice hard boiled eggs perfectly a good method is to dip a knife into boiling water and let it dry. Fresh bread may also be sliced this way.

Prunes or a small bag of spices cooked with sweet prunes will improve their flavor. Oregon prunes have a tart flavor naturally.
