OREGON DAIRYMEN WILL REVISE STATE PROGRAM

Oregon State Agricultural College, Corvallis, March 7—Visualizing Oregon as a potentially great dairying state of the Pacific slope, more than 100 dairymen and persons concerned with associated industries will attend the convention for the revision of Oregon's dairy program to be held at the college March 21-22. This is not designed as a mere "toaster" convention, say those in charge, but rather as a serious finding and facing of facts.

Coming as a result of a series of articles appearing in the Oregon Jour, sponsored by Marshall N. Dana associate editor, on the theme "Making Oregon the Great Dairy State," the convention has been organized to include discussion on all phases of the industry.

Committee chairmen and secretaries are: Production and management, Claude Buchanan, Benton county dairyman, N. C. Jamison, Corvallis; economic status of the dairy industry, George Fullenwider, Carlton dairyman, L. R. Breithaupt, Corvallis; finance committee, Will T. Wright, Oregon City banker, Dr. Milton N. Nelson, Corvallis; grades and standards, W. W. Black, Hood River creamery manager, E. S. Larrabee, dairy specialist, U. S. D. A.; disease control, C. C. Dickson, Shedd dairyman, P. M. Brandt, Corvallis; marketing, A. E. Engbreton, director of Lower Columbia Dairymen's association, George O. Gatlin, Corvallis.

Conditions favoring the industry and obstacles in way of its development have been considered by the committee drafting the program, of which Paul V. Maris, director of extension is chairman. Mr. Maris says the task of the convention is "to consider needed changes in present objectives and to suggest ways and means of making progress in the phases of the dairy business upon which unsatisfactory progress has been made."

FARM POINTERS

Oregon farmers interested in exhibiting products at the fairs are planning now and putting forth best efforts to select and grow prize winning crops and livestock for next fall's shows, says the experiment station.

Farmers in Oregon growing vegetables for canning or manufacture are now finding increased competition of fresh vegetables marketed the year round. In 1926-28 there was a consistent gain in acreage of all vegetables for manufacture except corn, cucumbers, peas and tomatoes. About 932,000 acres of vegetables were grown for canning purposes in 1928 with estimated valuation of \$46,000,000. Snap beans for canning have shown a more rapid increase than any other crop during the past few years, reports the experiment station.

It is fast approaching the time for poultrymen that are raising chicks to get brooding equipment ready. Clean and disinfect the houses, assemble and set up the brooding equipment and order fuel supply. See that the brooder stove is working properly and make any necessary repairs or improvements to the brooder houses or equipment so as to have everything ready before the rush of other spring duties, says the Oregon experiment station.
