**FARM REMINDERS**

Before transplanting to the field in Oregon, plants of early vegetables that have been grown under artificial heat are best hardened for 10 to 14 days to prevent any undue check in growth. Such plants as cabbage and lettuce, therefore, are hardened in cold frames by giving them various increasing amounts of air and also lessening the water supply. Then if these plants become slightly frosted they will be better able to withstand the lower temperatures, says the experiment station.

The business like farmer plans his crops and manages his livestock with careful thought as to what prices will be at market time rather than what they are now, says the Oregon experiment station.

Using the straw for livestock and the litter for fertilizer will boost the farm receipts through better returns from crops as well as from livestock.

Oregon gardeners growing cauliflower do best by producing this crop for fall use rather than late spring and early summer. While it can be grown during the latter season, cauliflower does best in the cool, moist condition of the fall season. The plants are much more subject to check in growth than cabbage, so that often a small head is formed before the plant has started to make much leaf growth, says the experiment station.

**HATCH TURKEYS IN INCUBATORS**

**Eggs Given Same Treatment as the Ordinary Hen.**

It takes 28 days but turkey eggs can be hatched in incubators just the same as hens' eggs. Turkey raisers in several parts of Colorado are saving hours and days of hard labor that way and in the eastern part of Wyoming it is almost the universal practice.

The big job is to get enough eggs together at one time for a full-sized setting. They should not be held for more than ten days, according to Charles N. Keen of the Colorado agricultural college, should be kept at a temperature of from 50 to 60 degrees Fahrenheit, and turned daily. The incubator should be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected then warmed to the correct temperature.

The temperature of hatching turkeys' eggs in the case of small machines, where the heat is at the top, may be one-half degree to one degree lower average than for hens' eggs. As a guide for those who do not have the instructions for their machine, the average temperature starts at about 101 degrees and increases to about 103 or 104 degrees the last week. If the eggs carry good fertility, the body heat from the developing poult will gradually bring up the temperature of the machine.

Additional moisture is needed as with hens' eggs. (A tray of sand kept wet will supply it.) Turkey poult should not be taken from the incubator until they are thoroughly dried off and appear strong on their legs.

When the eggs are set under hens or turkey hens, steps should be taken to insure freedom from lice or mites as these parasites cause very serious losses among the young poult. The nest boxes should be sprayed before the eggs are set. The setting hen should be dusted thoroughly with saponified sodium fluoride or some other good lice powder at least three times during the latter part of the setting period, but prior to the twenty-fifth day.
