CREAM STORAGE METHODS
INVESTIGATED BY O. S. C.

Methods by which the average dairy farmer may keep cream on the place for delivery only twice a week and still have his cream grade No. 1 sweet at the creamery, are sought in new experiments now under way at the Oregon experiment station at Corvallis. These tests, conducted as a joint project by the dairy department and the Oregon committee on electricity in agriculture, are prompted by the need of Oregon to raise its general standard of butter quality so as to compete successfully in out-of-state markets.

Various water cooling devices, home constructed electrical refrigeration boxes, engine operated units and other combinations are being tested in the most comprehensive trials of this nature ever conducted in this country on this subject. F. E. Price, agricultural engineer of the station, is in charge.

The milk used comes from two farm herds totaling 16 cows, this milk being produced on average farms where only ordinary care in production is used. It is stored un-

der the test conditions in a room in which the temperature is controlled to produce average summer heat. Several hours are allowed after each test for the cream to sit in this heat unprotected, to compensate for time in transit to the creamery.

The cream is delivered twice a week to the college plant where it is graded the same as any other received. Batches handled under varying conditions so far have graded No. 2 sour, which brings 8 cents below top prices, No. 1 sour at 3 cents discount and No. 1 sweet at the top premium price.

Valuable findings have already been made, although the tests are far from complete and it is the hope of those in charge that economical methods will be found that will permit the average dairy farm to have economical refrigeration for both dairy and general home use.

TUBERCULOSIS SOCIETY

HOLDS CLINICS IN STATE

Twenty-one Oregon citizens have been found to have tuberculosis and have been placed under care since the Early Discovery campaign started on April 1.

The campaign is being conducted under the direction of a state wide Early Discovery committee, appointed last January by the executive committee of the Oregon Tuberculosis association, and representing the Oregon state medical society, the University of Oregon medical school, the State Board of Health, the State Tuberculosis hospital and the general medical profession.

A group of Oregon clinicians volunteered their services to the various county and district medical societies for the holding of free chest clinics, or the presentation of special papers on the early discovery of tuberculosis. The Oregon Tuberculosis volunteered to pay the expenses of the clinicians out of the fund raised from the sale of Christmas seals. Twelve clinics and four medical papers were asked for. Four of the clinics have been held, and two more will be held this week. Clinics at Ashland, Medford, Pendleton and Bend furnished examinations to 66 persons 21 of whom were found tuberculous, and placed under care of their family physician. Some of them will be sent to sanatoria. Clinics will be held at Astoria and Grande Ronde this week.
