Mrs. R. H. O'Neil of Bucoda, Washington, is a guest at the home of her sister, Mrs. Ralph Richards.

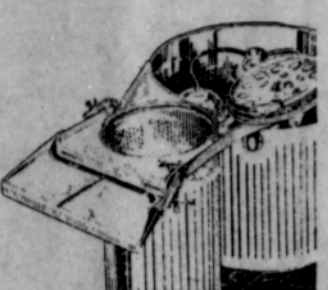
New Superintendent.

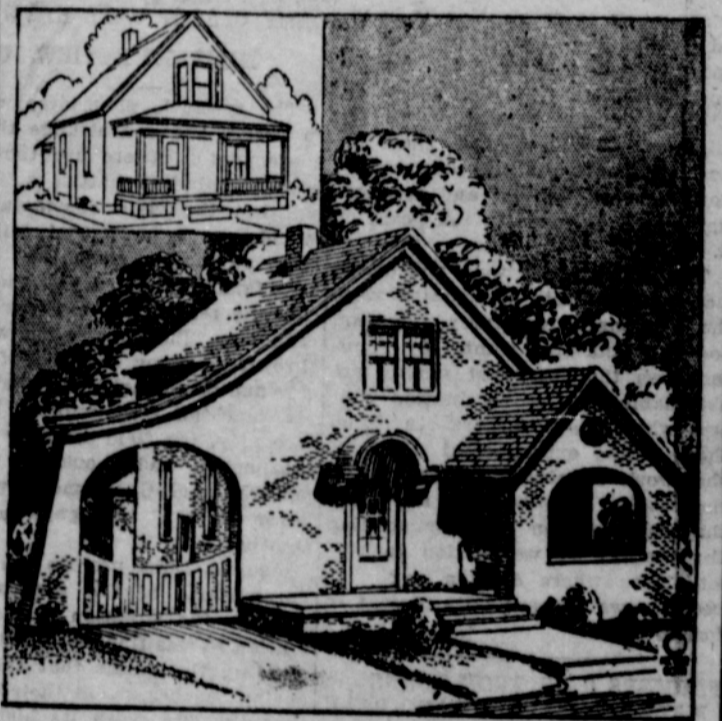

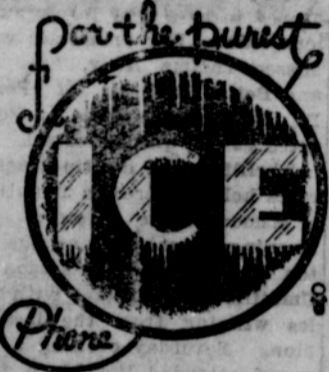
