CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CHURCHES

"Gaul" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, August 13.

The Golden Text was, "Rejoice the soul of thy servant: for unto thee, O Lord, do I lift up my soul" (Psalms 86:4).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "Happy is he that hath the God of Jacob for his help, whose hope is in the Lord his God" (Psalms 146:5).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following passage from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures", by Mary Baker Eddy: "When divine Science overcomes faith in a carnal mind, and faith in God destroys all faith in sin and in material methods of healing, then sin, disease, and death will disappear" (p. 395).
