DR. BELLINGER POINTS OUT

BENEFITS OF T. B. HOSPITAL

There are Now 75 Patients in The Tuberculosis Hospital at The Dalles.

Every section of Oregon is beginning to feel the benefit of the Eastern Oregon Tuberculosis Hospital opened at The Dalles the ninth of last July, according to Dr. G. C. Bellinger who was in Portland for a few hours Friday. The overcrowded conditions at the Salem hospital are being relieved by the transfer of fifteen patients in the past two weeks to the eastern Oregon institution. This means that both the patients who remain at Salem and those who are transferred will benefit. The waiting list has been cut, too, the state official declared so that it is no longer necessary for a victim of the disease who is financially unable to go to a private sanatorium to wait three or four months at home, where he may be exposing three or four other citizens of the state to the disease. Under this condition, Dr. Bellinger pointed out, the actual sufferer from the disease was not only in a dangerous position but also those with whom he was living. "By having the hospital at The Dalles we have actually saved both the individuals in the state, and the state treasury thousands of dollars, and what is more important, provided for the comfort of our afflicted neighbors," he said. "By reducing the chances of new infections" There are now 75 patients in The Dalles institution.
