

OREGON STATE NEWS OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week Assembled for Information of Our Readers.

The new bridge over the Umpqua river at Scottsburg was opened to traffic October 10.

Fifty-five million chinook salmon eggs will be hatched in Oregon this year, reports the state fish commission.

The registration at Albany college will show about 30 more students than last year. The freshman class is nearly double.

The Astoria chamber of commerce has asked the county court to include in its budget next year \$1000 for publicity purposes.

Attorney General Van Winkle will conduct through the state game commission an investigation of the Cello fishing situation.

To improve the distribution of gas the Northwest Cities Gas company is spending \$15,000 in Pendleton laying new feeder mains.

Coos Bay shipping of lumber and logs for September shows a gain over the previous month. The export footage was 7,734,619 feet.

The widening of the John Day highway between Vale and Jamieson has been completed by a state highway department crew.

Earl H. Bryant, 73, was killed when an old house at Orasco which he was tearing down under contract, collapsed and crushed him.

The Hotel Central, a large three-story frame building and landmark of Central Point, is being torn down to make room for a modern structure.

The liberation of 400,000 seven-inch trout has been made by the state game commission in the Deschutes and tributaries, from the Oak Springs hatchery.

Between 35 and 40 active workers from Lane, Douglas, Josephine and Jackson counties were present, including regular health workers and volunteers.

Representatives of four counties gathered in Medford to attend the tuberculosis seal institute held for the purpose of outlining a program to be followed this winter.

Farmers in the Mount Laki district, Klamath county, have filed with the district attorney complaints that hunters are molesting their cattle and otherwise trespassing.

Portland postoffice receipts rose 5.37 per cent in September over September of last year, the postoffice department announces, with a total for the month of \$250,000.

Many deer perished during and following the big forest fire west of Camas valley recently. Woodsmen have seen many carcasses of deer burned during the fire.

The Cottage Grove Golf club has filed articles of incorporation, completing the organization of a group that started two years ago to lay plans for a modern golf course.

The Consumers' Gas corporation of California has asked the city of Klamath Falls for a franchise to operate a plant in that city. The company will expend \$750,000 on the plant.

Logging operations in Clatsop county during the past assessment year have resulted in the removal of 790,245,000 feet of timber, according to announcement from the assessor's office.

Fossil remains of three-toed horses have been found by local natural history students in the Gateway area of Jefferson county just north of Madras. This is the first time remains of the original horse have been found in the Deschutes region, previous discoveries having been confined to the John Day country.
