Notice is hereby given to the legal voters of School Dist. No. 14 of Umatilla County, State of Oregon, that an election will be held in said district at the school building on the 16th day of November, 1929, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, to vote on the question of increasing the amount of the tax levy in said district for the year 1930 by more than 6 per cent over the amount of such levy for the year immediately preceding. NOTICE OF SCHOOL MEETING

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN to the legal voters of School District No. 14, of Umatilla County, State of Oregon, that a SCHOOL MEETING of said district will be held at the School House, on the 16th day of November, 1929, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon for the purpose of discussing the budget hereinafter set out with the levying board, and to vote on the proposition of levying a special district tax.
 The total amount of money needed by the said school district during the fiscal year beginning on June 17, 1929, and ending June 18, 1930, is estimated in the following budget and includes the amounts to be received from the county school fund, state school fund, elementary school fund, special district tax, and all other moneys of the district.
 Until the ballots are counted at least one hour after the time set for the meeting in districts of the second and third classes, any legal voter of the district shall be entitled to vote upon any matters before the meeting.
