THEY WANT IRRIGATED PRODUCTS

The activities of a Salem cannery were recently commented upon and praised in the editorial columns of a Portland newspaper. The work and success of this cannery should be of timely interest to those in this community who are working for a local cannery.

Among the interesting facts in this editorial was the statement that the cannery is contracting for many acres of vegetables next year, preferably on irrigated land. The Salem cannery found such a demand for canned beets and carrots that it was even obliged to send to other districts for its supply.

"This is an example of what a properly directed cannery produces for a community," the editorial says. "Carrots, for instance, are a negligible product on the ordinary farm. . . . But with a cannery on the job, developing a market for its products, there is an increasing demand for fresh carrots. . . . Salem is to be congratulated upon the far-sighted intelligence with which it has gone out after industries. When farm and factory keep step, they set a swift pace for progress."

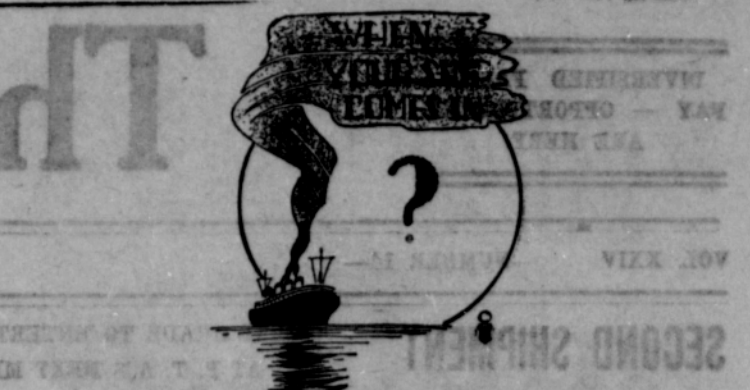
