UMATILLA NEWS ITEMS

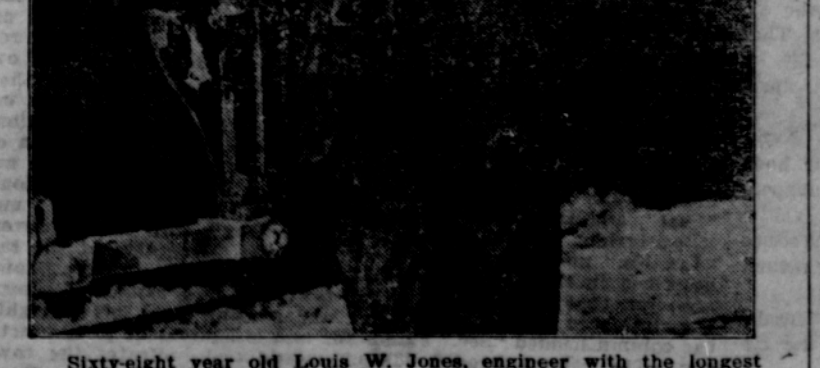

Union Pacific's Oldest Engineer



Sixty-eight year old Louis W. Jones, engineer with the longest service (47 years) on the northwestern unit of the Union Pacific, has a job as "Old Timer" Bobby Hamilton, 3, of Walla Walla. Bobby gets up early, even on the coldest mornings, to run over to the Walla Walla station, a block from his home, to see his engineer friend pull out with the local freight which runs between Walla Walla and Wallula, Washington. Engineer Jones has worked continuously for the Union Pacific since February 24, 1883 and has been an engineer since October 19, 1887. He has worked for but one road, the Union Pacific, and has never left the Northwest. He began railroading when cordwood was still burned in locomotives on some parts of the line. He piloted the first train over the Snake River bridge at Riparia, Washington in 1888 and the excursion train which brought people to the unveiling of the Marcus Whitman monument at Walla Walla about 30 years ago. As senior engineer on his division he has many times been called upon to take the throttle of special trains carrying such notables as ex-President Taft, Theodore Roosevelt, and E. H. Harriman. He will be retired and pensioned, according to the rules of the Union Pacific, in 1931. The Union Pacific, with 3,324 miles of track in its Pacific Northwest unit, employs 500 locomotive engineers in Oregon and Washington. It pays over a million dollars in taxes annually in each state.
