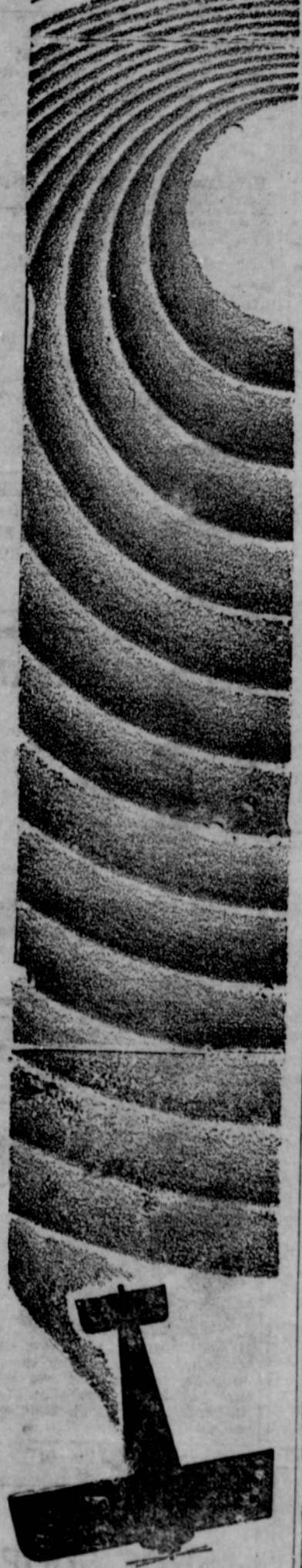

### HOME-ECONOMICS

cleaning laundry work, dry cleaning and many other related problems. In the unit on "Child Care and Guidance" the girls are given lessons on how to bathe and dress a baby, how to train a child in good habits of nutrition, care of sick children, first aid, etc. Under foods comes how to plan a balanced meal, food values,

what combinations of foods are best from the health point of view. Then they are taught how to serve a meal correctly.

Health and health habits are emphasized throughout the course. As "we learn to do by doing," and also because the doing adds interest to the course, during the Clothing unit the girls are taught sewing, and during the Foods unit they plan, cook and serve meals.

The second year's work is a continuation of the first year, going more deeply into practically the same problems.

The importance of Home Economics as a part of our public school education is becoming increasingly evident. Statistics compiled by the Federal government show that forty-five per cent of the girls in the high schools are being given home economics training. The Bureau of Education of the Department of the Interior has estimated that there are seven thousand boys in forty-two states being taught the principles of American home life. In many states home economics is part of the seventh and eighth grade work. Our own state is working out such a course.

The happiest homes are those made comfortable to live in. It is the business of some one to see that the family is well fed, comfortably dressed and happy, and this can only be done by one educated for appreciation and skill in the art of home making.
