OREGON STATE NEWS OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week Assembled for Information of Our Readers.

In removing snow from roads Marion county spent \$125 each day, using five outfits, according to the report of Roadmaster Johnson.

Lester D. Kelly, 53, Maupia hotel man and ex-wealthy rancher, committed suicide by shooting himself in the mouth with a revolver.

The rates of the Hermiston Light & Power company are not unreasonable, according to an order issued by the public service commission at Salem.

Over 40 Washington county farmers have thus far filed requests for apportionments from the carload of certified clover seed recently arrived from Ohio.

Standard equipment in all schools of Lincoln county, regardless of size of the school or value of the respective district, is credited to the county unit system now in use there.

Firing at something he saw moving in the brush, Amos Bilyeu of Golsen shot and killed Ralph Finn, also of Golsen, while the two men were hunting in the woods five miles southwest of the town.

A citrus tree which bears oranges, lemons and grapefruit withstood the recent zero weather and is showing strong signs of bursting forth in bloom. The tree is kept in a hothouse in Grants Pass.

Robert Dugger, veteran railroad fireman of The Dalles, died at a hospital there from burns received January 16 when a train on the Shaniko branch of the O.-W. R. & N. line was wrecked near Grass Valley.

Roseburg's population has shown a substantial gain during the past 10 years, according to the school census. In 1920 the school census base showed a population of 1395. This year's figures indicate 1591.

The city of Jacksonville has donated a tract of land to be used as a truck terminal and machine shops for the Webber Construction company, which operates a string of trucks in hauling copper ore from the Blue Lodge mine.

Cold weather had its effect on St. Helens' volunteer fire department, when only four men answered a second public alarm, and as a result Bowen's general store burned to the ground. The loss is estimated at \$25,000.

Three goldfish were placidly swimming in their bowl at the home of Mrs. M. C. Painter in The Dalles, apparently none the worse for an arctic adventure that resulted in their being frozen for three days in a solid block of ice.

Announcement of the plan to erect a \$500,000 paper mill in Eugene was made recently. A site has been obtained on the Coos bay branch of the Southern Pacific railway and it is announced that construction will begin by February 1 and the plant be completed by August 1.

Fire of undetermined origin destroyed a large warehouse at Imbler recently, burning 6000 boxes of apples and equipment, and caused a loss of \$20,000, according to owners. Three carloads of apples in the building were to have been shipped to market within the next few days.

Seventy-seven fires in Oregon outside Portland during December resulted in losses aggregating \$117,671, the lowest for any December in five years, according to reports filed with Clara A. Lee, state insurance commissioner. Fire losses throughout the state, exclusive of Portland, for 1929 totalled \$3,834,717, or \$343,079 less than those of 1928 and \$173,862 under the average for the previous five years.

Newberg firemen battled a blaze which for a time threatened the storage tanks of the Shell Oil company there. The fire, which destroyed an abandoned box factory, assumed spectacular proportions.

Every town in Linn county but one will enjoy a reduction of taxes, according to Grant Froman, county assessor. Sweet Home, which paid a total tax of 52.3 mills last year, will pay 64.3 mills this year.

Milo Starr, 33, dropped 250 feet to his death in a shaft of the Oregon Copper company near Keating, when the cage in which he was riding broke loose from the cable and dropped to the bottom of the Balm creek shaft.

T. E. Meriwether, 57, prominent Gold Beach man, was drowned when his motor boat was swamped at Two-Mile riffle on Rogue river, between Agness and Ilaha. His wife, who was on the bank of the river, saw her husband die.

Criminal cases in the state of Oregon have nearly tripled since the year 1917, while other court actions have increased in smaller proportion, according to a report prepared by Arthur S. Benson, clerk of the state supreme court.

After several years of discussion and experimentation the Douglas county court has adopted a new system for road maintenance work, grouping several districts under one supervision. This will reduce the number of supervisors from 62 to 24.

The Boy Scouts of Roseburg are getting ready to observe the 20th anniversary of scouting. Invitations are being given to the Scout troops of nearby communities to participate in a program during anniversary week, beginning February 10.

Italy to Send Planes in Nonstop N. Y. Hop

Rome.—The Italian government is preparing to send a fleet of ten military hydro-airplanes on a nonstop flight from Italy to New York next March.

Crews of the ten great Savoia-Marchetti ships have been undergoing an intensive training for the transatlantic trip and several of them have undertaken flights for 40 consecutive hours over Lakes Garda and Barcellano.

The air ministry, which is to direct the flight, has arranged for co-operation with the navy and scout ships and destroyers will be stationed along the route ready to assist in the event of an emergency. Italo Balbo, air minister, will command the flight in person.

The project will constitute the 1930 cruise of Italy's aerial navy. In 1928 the air forces carried out an extensive flight over the western Mediterranean sea and northern Africa. This year the ships flew over the eastern Mediterranean and Black sea.

France in 5th Place in Europe's Population

Paris.—The government has published statistics which show that France, in 1780 the largest nation in the western world, has fallen to fifth place in Europe as a result of its decreased birth rate. In 1780 France had 20,000,000 inhabitants; Russia, 25,000,000; Austria, 18,000,000; England, 12,000,000, and Prussia, 6,000,000. At present France has 40,000,000; Italy, 41,000,000; Japan, 60,000,000; Germany, 64,000,000; the British empire, 73,000,000; Russia, 115,000,000, and the United States, 118,000,000.

Wedding Cake Weighing 200 Pounds Has 360 Eggs

Buffalo, N. Y.—When Rose Ruddick was married recently to Charles Farber, her father, a baker, decided he'd let some one else bake the wedding cake and thus enjoy the occasion the more. And his lucky for him he did. Walter Clichecki, hired to do the job, turned out a cake weighing more than 200 pounds. It required 92 pounds of sugar, 36 pounds of butter, 360 eggs, 36 pounds of frosting sugar, and 26 pounds of flour.

Swerving From Right Cause of Accidents

Boston.—Failure to keep on the right side of the road when the motorist's view is obstructed is the principal cause of automobile accidents, at least in Massachusetts. Out of a total of 3,556 accident cases studied, this factor prevailed in 1,084 instances. Other causes were listed as follows: Speeding, 909; drunken driving, 417; failure to keep right side of road when meeting vehicles, 403; reckless driving, 355; unlicensed driving, 232.

A series of as many as 28 words in several foreign languages were dictated and she repeated them correctly. In the order given, without a mistake.
