decided if the women of the community would be in favor of a cannery and would back it, they would see that a cannery is started. The committee in charge, Mrs. B. Hutchison, Mrs. F. Guilwits and Mrs. Cecil Madden, would like to know what the people of the community think of this idea, so a sheet of paper will be left in the Herald office and all those interested will put down their names and give as far as possible a rough estimate of the different things they wish to can and the probable amounts of each. They expect to begin operation, if such a cannery is desired in Hermiston, in time to take care of low priced asparagus.

The following plans have been outlined: 1. To place in each store room of the project a cheap supply of canned vegetables, canned as well and as

safely as any commercial product on the market.

2. To save the waste on the products and therefore cut down the food cost.

3. It is expected to relieve the housewife of the really disagreeable part of home canning. In other words save her from watching a boiler from 3 or 4 hours at a time while she would can about 11 quarts of vegetables that might or might not be fit for food. Mrs. Hutchison states that "we expect to do this for her at a cost not to exceed 25 cents for 10 quarts. However, a few quarts of many may be brought to the cannery at a time, arrangements to be made a few days before hand. It is planned to have a competent lady in charge, most of the work of preparation as far as possible to be done in the home."
