## STATE NEWS

The state board of control has awarded to the General Petroleum corporation a contract for 1,000,000 gallons of gasoline at a basic price of 13 1/2 cents a gallon delivered in Portland. This is 3 cents per gallon less than paid by the state during the past year.

Belated reports following the coastal storm of last week show Port Orford's port dock sustained considerable damage when the wind tore off half the dock fish receiving station and blew part of it into the sea, and other portions to a high hill back of the structure.

More than 1,000,000 fish will be brought from the hatchery at Union by the state game commission and held in ponds at Wallowa, Lostine, Enterprise and Joseph until they reach a size of five or six inches, when they will be turned into the streams of Wallowa county.

Almost 2000 Oregon trappers, who failed to make the legally required report on their fur take for the 1928-29 trapping season, will be arrested and subjected to a court trial as a result of a 40 per cent "fur report deficiency," discovered on the state game commission books.

Progress in the quest for oil being made at Fishtrap is satisfactory, the officials of the company say, and the well is down more than 300 feet. The work brings stories of oil indications in the vicinity of Stringtown, one mile west of Myrtle Point, where it was first intended to drill.

J. H. Medrow and J. M. Johnson of San Francisco announce that construction will start within ten days on the Cascade Box company plant three miles south of Klamath Falls. The plant will cost \$50,000 and will employ 50 men. It will have an output of 30 carloads or 900,000 box shooks monthly.

The owners of the Mankin-Bell gold mine on Poorman's creek out from Jacksonville announce that the mine is scheduled to reopen soon. While the vein on the mine is not large, the ore is rich enough to make it profitable to operate the property, and there are prospects of opening large bodies of ore at greater depths.

One week after he was accidentally shot while returning from a rabbit hunt, Daniel Bland, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Bland of near Redmond, died in a Bend hospital. Young Bland was injured when a 22-caliber rifle resting against his side was accidentally discharged when the youth and James Beaver were riding in an automobile.

W. M. Shrode of San Diego, Cal., representing a firm which is raising and marketing peas, has selected Coos and Curry counties as offering the best location for August and September output. It is the hope of the concern which Mr. Shrode represents to secure a tract of 300 acres to work under company management, and to induce many ranchers to plant special ly for furnishing the company peas to be delivered in the months named.

Prospect for a loan of \$200,000 from the federal government for the establishment of five scutching plants in the Willamette valley is encouraging, according to W. B. Dartram, superintendent of the state flax industry, who returned to Salem from Washington. Dartram was told by the farm board that under the law the loan could be furnished only to co-operatively owned plants. Organization of the co-operative plant, such as is required by the government, will not be difficult, he said.

J. E. Hallyburton is ill with a severe attack of the flu on his ranch in the Columbia district.

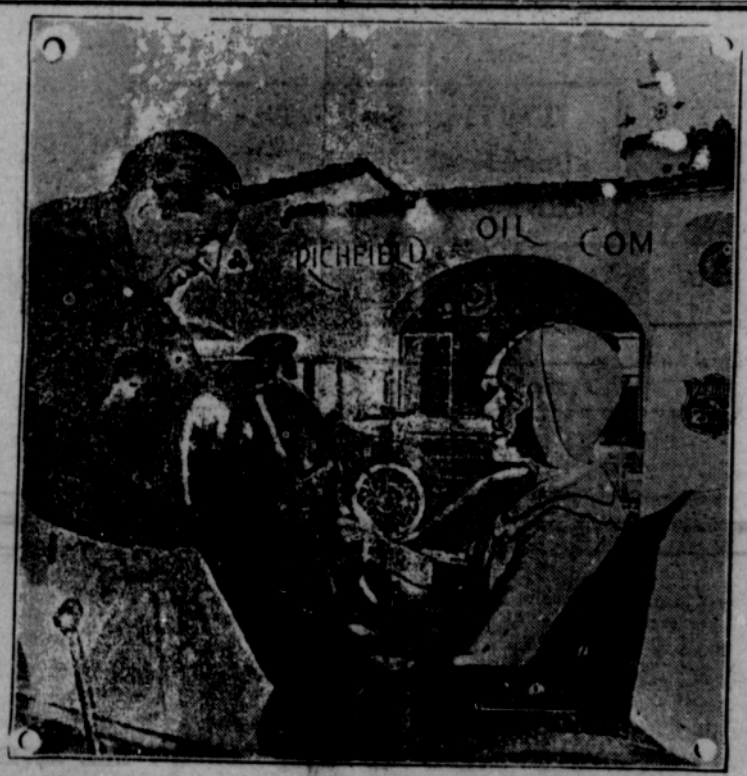
