CITY IRRIGATION WATER ASSESSMENT FOR YEAR 1930
 District No. 1

Notice is hereby given that in accordance with Ordinance No. 76 as amended by Ordinance No. 122 and 125 of the City of Hermiston, the City Council of said City has, by ordinance No. 132 entitled "An ordinance levying an assessment upon the land in the City Irrigation District No. 1 for the year 1930," passed by the Council and approved by the Mayor on March 19, 1930, levied an assessment upon the following lots and parcels of land in said Irrigation District No. 1 established by said ordinance No. 76 as amended, for the purpose of collecting a special improvement assessment to pay for the cost of water for irrigation and delivery to the said lots and parcels of land, being all the land within said irrigation district and for construction and maintaining an irrigation system therefore.

The total cost of the construction and maintenance of the irrigation system is \$910.31; the contract price to be paid the Hermiston Irrigation District for water for irrigation in said district is \$1.50 per acre for two acre feet and 50 cents per acre foot for excess water; the total amount of the assessment in said irrigation district is \$1041.31.

The assessment is now due and payable at the office of the City Recorder and if not paid before May 1, 1930 the same shall become delinquent and shall bear interest at the legal rate.

The amount of the assessment apportioned and assessed against the particular lots and parcels of land in said district is as follows:
