"Auful. Even people vot can't pay is buying nothing."

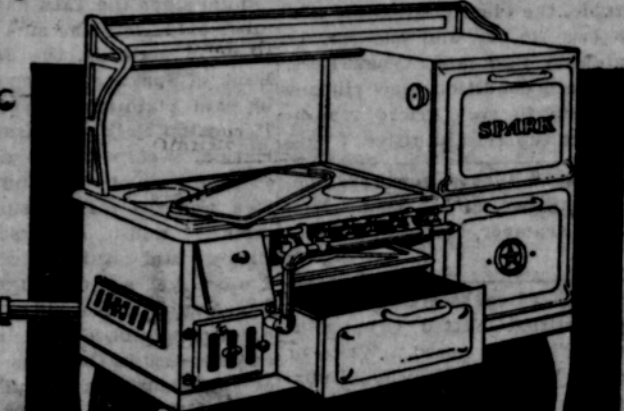
This is about the time of the year to put up fly screens.
