CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CHURCHES

"Doctrine of Atonement" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, April 20.

The Golden Text was, "If any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new" (II Cor. 5:17).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "And you hath he quickened, who were dead in trespasses and sins; . . . For through him we both have access by one Spirit unto the Father" (Eph. 2: 1, 18).

The Lesson-Sermon also included one of the religious tenets of Christian Science, from its denominational textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures", by Mary Baker Eddy: "4. We acknowledge Jesus' atonement as the evidence of divine, efficacious Love, unfolding man's unity with God through Christ Jesus the Way-shower; and we acknowledge that man is saved through Christ, through Truth, Life, and Love as demonstrated by the Galilean Prophet in healing the sick and overcoming sin and death" (p. 497).
