CANNERY OPERATIONS ARE STARTED SATURDAY, APRIL 26

The community cannery under the auspices of the Farm Bureau Auxiliary started operations Saturday, April 26, when Mr. Thomas Orndorff from the Oregon State college demonstrating how the canning was done. In the course of the day salmon and asparagus were canned in tins.

The machinery consists of one rector which is large enough to can 100 quarts at a time, which takes about one hour. In figuring this way one can see that 800 quarts of meats, vegetables or fruits could be canned in one day. A hand seamer for the cans is being used now but tentative plans are going forward for the installation of an automatic seamer which will be much easier and save much time. Mrs. Frank Guilwits is manager of the cannery and this work will be done on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays and anyone wishing to can on any one of these days is asked to have their material at the cannery not later than 1 o'clock of that day. All those wishing to can asparagus are urged to hurry as the asparagus season is almost over.

CHILD'S BILL OF RIGHTS ISSUED BY HERBERT HOOVER

A child's bill of rights which was issued by Herbert Hoover in connection with Thursday, May 1, which is National Child Health Day and was set by the American Child Health association is printed below. "The ideals to which we should strive is that there shall be no child in America: That has not been born under proper conditions. That does not live in hygienic surroundings. That ever suffers from undernourishment. That does not have prompt and efficient medical attention and inspection. That does not receive primary instruction in the elements of hygiene and good health. That has not the complete birthright of a sound mind in a sound body. That has not the encouragement to express in fullest measure the spirit within which is the final endowment of every human being." Herbert Hoover.

BEE MEN TO HOLD MEETING MAY 10 WITH H. A. SCULLEN

Unpacking Demonstration to be Held Same Day on George Bancroft Place.

Local bee men will have an opportunity to meet and discuss their problems with H. A. Scullen, extension entomologist, from the Oregon State college, on Saturday, May 10, at the Hermiston library.

Mr. Scullen will also conduct an unpacking demonstration on the Geo. Bancroft place during the day of May 10. This pack was put up last fall with the assistance of local men, and Mr. Scullen plans to unpack and examine it at this time to determine the extent, if any, of winter injury and to see how it came through the cold weather.

As this pack has been carried on somewhat in the nature of an experiment, the results of this examination should be of interest to all those in this vicinity that are interested in bees, as the findings will probably have a bearing on the future recommendations of the extension department at the college regarding the care and handling of hives of bees in this locality.

NUMEROUS BUSINESS CHANGES FOR MAY 1

Numerous business changes are taking effect May the first or shortly thereafter which will add considerably to the business district of Hermiston both in convenience as well as looks. The Hermiston Light & Power Company will be located in their new home on Main street which they recently purchased from J. H. Williams and formerly occupied by Burk's Inc.

C. C. Conley who moved to Hermiston recently will open his jewelry store in the building next to the post-office as soon as it is vacated by the Light and Power company.

MacMarr Stores which are entering the Hermiston field will occupy the building which they recently leased from the Oregon Hardware & Implement Company and formerly occupied by Hurly's Cash Grocery.

While Burk's Inc. will have its new home in the building across the track formerly occupied by Hurly's grocery.

The Claude Keck barber shop will change hands and a new owner, Mr. F. A. Roumagoux of Pendleton, will take possession immediately. There will be no change in the location of the barber shop. Also the Farm Bureau Auxiliary cannery is in operation as well as the community laundry, which organizations occupy the brick buildings on the west side of town.

WORKING PARAPHERNALIA TO BE IN EVIDENCE

Program For State Highway Beautification By Chairman

Effort to beautify all of the state highways in Oregon will be centralized on Saturday, May 10, which has been proclaimed State Highway Clean-up Day by Governor A. W. Norblad, who has called on all civic organizations of the state to aid in the work. The State Federation of Garden clubs inaugurated the movement, with Mrs. Jessie M. Honeyman, Eugene, as chairman.

In preparation for the tourist travel this summer, boy scouts, members of chambers of commerce and service clubs, school children and numerous others will turn out on May 10 to tidy up the roadways.

Community meetings are being called all over the state by the leaders to assign various jobs and territory. Each mile of highway will have two teams working on it, one on either side, while state highway trucks will gather up the rubbish and carry it away.

The order of the day, as announced by Mrs. Honeyman, is as follows:

The workers assemble at mile posts designated by the leaders, at 8:30 in the morning. Sections of the highway will then be allotted to the group, with two leaders and two groups for each mile. After the leaders have given instructions to the workers, and have distributed tools to those who are not already equipped, work will start at 9 o'clock.

Work is to be confined to the roadside between the traveled area of the highway and the fence line bordering the legal right of way. No work is to be done on private property except by permission of the owner or occupant, and then only as directed by the section leader.

All workers should bring a rake for pulling dead grass and other debris left by winter into small piles. Four-tined pitchforks will be of use, also, according to the leaders, while a few prying hooks of various types may be of service. Shovels and spades will be useful all along the highway.
