

### ASPARAGUS SEASON DRAWS TO CLOSE

The asparagus season which has been on for the past five weeks is now soon coming to a close. Several growers have stopped cutting for good; while others are harrowing the fields and expect to continue cutting later if the price will justify it. Among those who have finished for good is Mr. McMullen who decided that 300 crates from 3 1/2 acres was enough for one season. The cannery has been busy for the past week putting some of the grass in tins, and it is expected that next week will see a rush there, as many local people are planning to can large supplies of this good cheap food for winter use.

Among the recent arrivals on this project is the asparagus beetle; a near relative of the potato beetle and resembling this bug in its habits. Growers are advised to let some plants grow up to attract the beetles and flatter spray these plants with arsenate of lead.
