700 BOYS ENROLLED IN CITIZENS' MILITARY CAMP

With enrollment of nearly 700, the Citizens' Military Training Camp started regular activities this week on the 30-day program of citizenship, athletics and military discipline being given by the government to boys of 17 to 24 years from Oregon and southwestern Washington.

The camp this year is the largest in the nine years of C. M. T. C., and young men are here from every county in Oregon.

Regular army officers and enlisted men are instructors in the camp, and C. M. T. C. boys with previous camp experience are serving as non-commissioned officers. The students are organized into one battalion of four companies, each of which has its separate mess hall, where army cooks prepare the food to satisfy the hearty appetites of the C. M. T. C. boys.

Opportunity to participate in athletic contests and games is afforded every boy, and many trophies will be distributed at the end of the camp next month, to winners in various sports, including baseball, boxing, swimming, tennis and golf. Medals for proficiency in discipline and organization activities also will be awarded.

(Isa. 52:7).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures", by Mary Baker Eddy: "Today the healing power of Truth is widely demonstrated as an immanent, eternal Science, instead of a phenomenal exhibition.
