Harold Dean returned to Hermiston the first of the week from North Dakota where he accompanied his wife and baby son. Mrs. Dean and

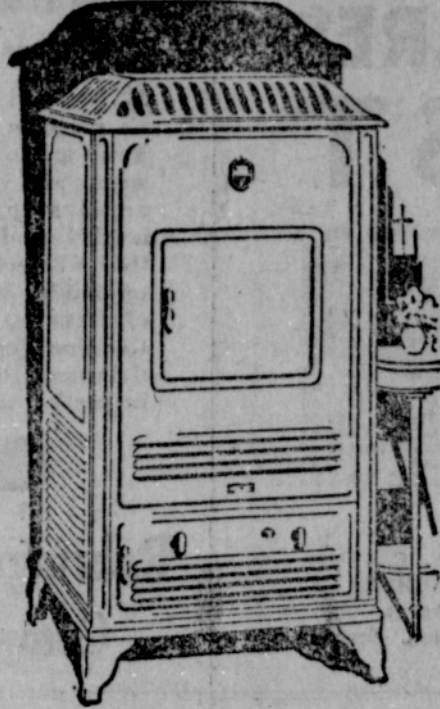
baby stayed in North Dakota where they will visit several weeks with Mrs. Dean's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Broston.
