CONGRATULATIONS LADIES

The ladies of the Farm Bureau Auxiliary who have successfully operated the Community cannery during the summer are to be congratulated.

Starting with a meager equipment, then adding a modern capping machine, this experiment has developed into a realization that berries, asparagus, beans, squash, pickles, tomatoes and other vegetables that grow in abundance throughout the irrigated sections tributary to Hermiston, calls for a larger commercial cannery where acres of produce may be raised, with a ready market available.

This is not a day dream or an unreasonable accomplishment, but a concrete fact that right here in our own city there is an opening for one of the best paying factories in this part of the state. Naturally it takes work and co-operation, but with a signed amount of acreage at so much per ton at the cannery door, would not the farmers be eager to transfer their idle acres into dollars? The solution is organization, and with the proper support there is no reason why thousands of cases of canned goods are not marketed each year.

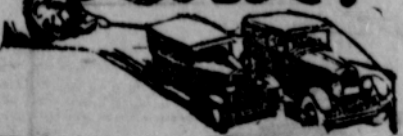
