WORK ON FEED CANAL STARTED BY IRRIGATION DISTRICT

Last week work was started by the Hermiston Irrigation District on the feed canal leading to the Cold Springs reservoir. Growth of willows has narrowed the channel of the big ditch near Stanfield making it impractical to either plow or mow as has been previously done, and the big dragline with a crew of men has been put on the work. Enos D. Martin, superintendent of the district, states that with the widening of the channel and the further cleaning of the canal it will be possible to fill the Cold Springs reservoir this winter without the aid of the McKay water, which he says will not be forthcoming this fall. Water will not be released from the McKay reservoir this fall or winter. Precipitation in the Blue mountains, the source of the local supply of water, is said to have been but 24 per cent of normal the past season. With a good flow of water in the Umatilla river it is possible to fill the Cold Springs reservoir in about 60 days. Water will be available for irrigation throughout the month of September, according to Mr. Martin, which will assure ranchers of late pasture and in some cases a fourth cutting of alfalfa hay.

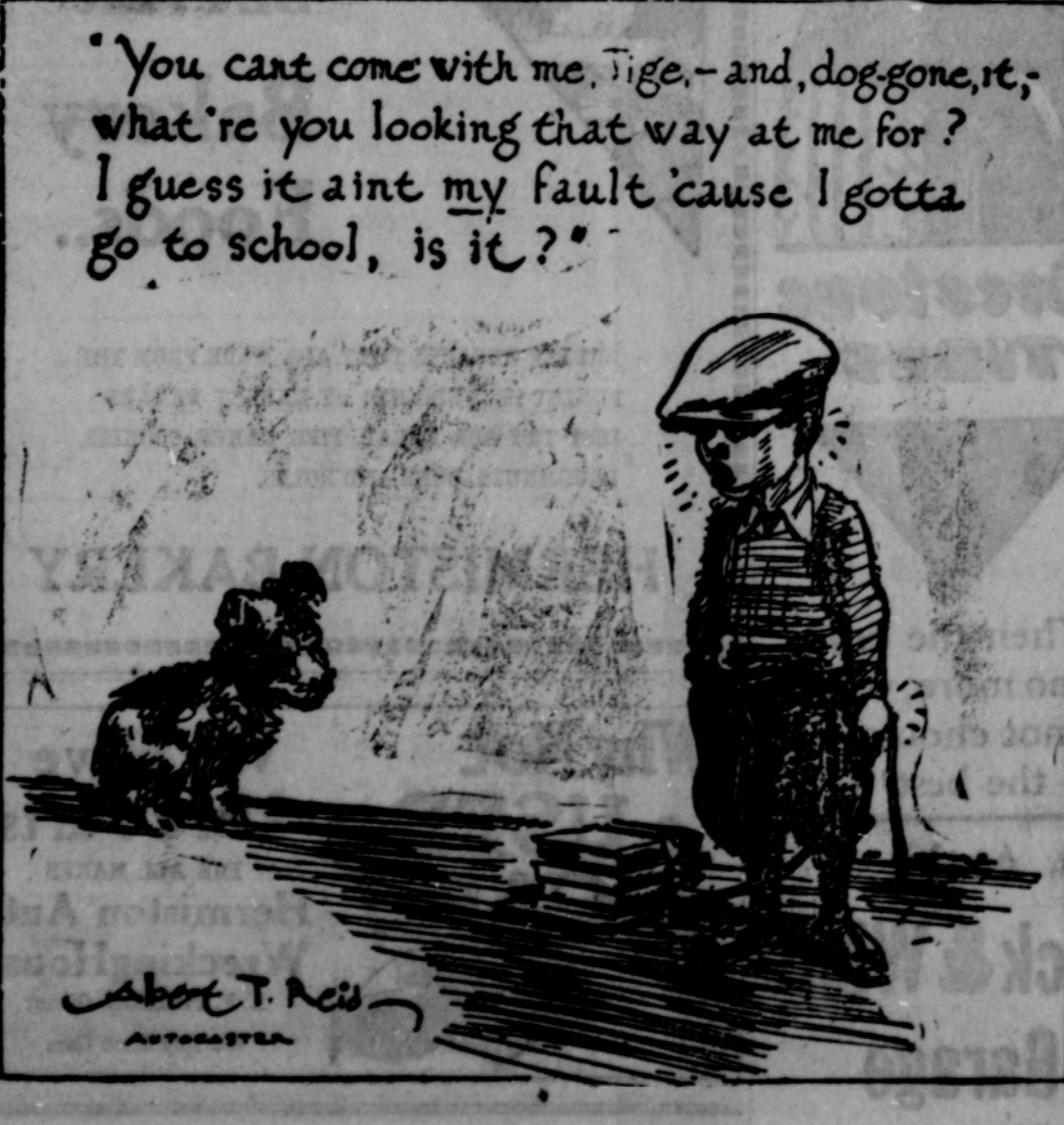
ASPARAGUS TO BE SERVED AT PROJECT FAIR OCTOBER 3 & 4
