# The Dairy Dollar

Each year the creameries of Umatilla County pay One Million Dollars or more to the dairy farmers for milk and cream. Payment is made monthly, or oftener.

These dollars do not stay long with the farmer. He puts them into circulation at once, paying his bill with the grocer, the physician, the hardware dealer, in fact, the dairy dollar finds its way into every channel of local trade and helps maintain all forms of business and industry in Umatilla County.

Prices which the creameries pay for milk and cream are not governed by the creameries themselves. They are based on the market price for butter, and any increase is passed on at once to the dairy farmer.

In Oregon, during the last twenty years, those communities which have dairy farming and dairy manufacturing for a background have suffered least from business depressions.
