"Bigger and Better Than Ever" is the battle cry of the executive board of the Hermiston Project Fair to be held in Hermiston this Friday and Saturday, October 3 and 4.

Bigger displays, better displays, more cooperation, more enthusiasm, mark the reports of superintendents and workers in the different divisions.

Interest in the fair is keen all over the project and each superintendent has been working hard to get entrants in line and make each division an attractive part of a successful fair. On Friday, the day will be principally taken up with judging with various sports for children in the afternoon. Saturday the program will consist of judging club exhibits and sports, and a football game between Hermiston and Pendleton. Also an airplane will be on hand both days.

The Legion boys are working overtime, as well as the Legion Auxiliary, getting their concessions and the "Days of '49" shows in shape. They will provide plenty of carnival features on the grounds for old and young and a small show including a Ferris wheel and various stunts has been engaged. The jitney dances in the evening under the auspices of the Legion, will draw a large crowd and the games of chance in connection are expected to be one of the big drawing cards of the fair.

Four-H club work will this year be particularly featured at the fair. Umatilla club members have returned from the State Fair, at which they were successful in several of their projects, and their exhibits and demonstrations should attract considerable attention.

FARM BUREAU TO HOLD MEETING MONDAY, OCTOBER 13

A call by the secretary, Sidney Barnard, has been issued to the membership of the Farm Bureau, for a meeting to be held October 13, in the Methodist church at 2 P. M. for the purpose of considering building plans which will be submitted at that time. An amendment to the by-laws will also be considered at the meeting. At the annual meeting of the Bureau last February a proposition of a new site and building for the Farm Bureau Co-operative was up for consideration and after considerable discussion it was voted to postpone the building program until such time as plans and specifications together with costs of the building had been obtained, when a meeting of the bureau would be called to consider them.

RECORD OF EXPERIMENTAL TURKEY FLOCK GIVEN

H. E. Cosby to Meet With Turkey Growers Friday, Oct. 10 at the Experiment Station.

A record of the turkey flock at the Umatilla Experimental Farm shows that the loss from disease for the summer has been less than one per cent. These birds have been under confinement and kept on clean ground, being moved frequently. H. E. Cosby, Extension Poultryman, who has been, in a way, directing this work and is very much interested in the results, will attend a meeting of the turkey growers on Friday, October 10, at 2 o'clock P. M., at the experiment station.

Mr. Cosby will discuss the results and point out the advantages to the turkey men of the project. Mr. F. L. Knowlton poultryman of the Oregon experiment station will also attend the meeting and discuss turkey rations with particular attention being given to the finishing feeds.

MARKETING ORGANIZATION FORMED AT HERMISTON

Herbert Beyers Assisted the Local Growers in Organizing Friday and Describes Other Associations.

Turkey growers from the Hermiston, Boardman and Stanfield communities completed arrangements for the formation of a co-operative marketing association at a meeting held in Hermiston Friday, September 26.

Herbert Beyers, manager of the Roseburg Turkey Growers' association has recently been appointed by the Federal Farm Board to carry on organization work with the turkey growers of Oregon, and was present to assist the local growers in setting up their organization. Mr. Beyers described the set-up of the Northwest Marketing association, and the part that Oregon must take in furthering the interests of the large association.

After some discussion, the growers present voted to form a marketing organization to be called the Eastern Oregon Turkey Growers' Association with headquarters at Hermiston.

A temporary board of directors, or organization committee of seven men was elected to incorporate the organization and secure membership. The following men were elected to serve on this committee:

When the membership list is completed a meeting will be held to elect a permanent board of directors to carry on the business of the organization.

The organization of the growers places them in a much better position to bargain with the buyers for the disposal of their birds, as they will be able to act collectively in securing bids. The Roseburg association has offered to handle the marketing for the local association if the members so desire, and if a sufficient tonnage is available to make it practical to set up a receiving station here. However it will be up to the permanent board of directors to make marketing connections that will be of most value to the buyers.
