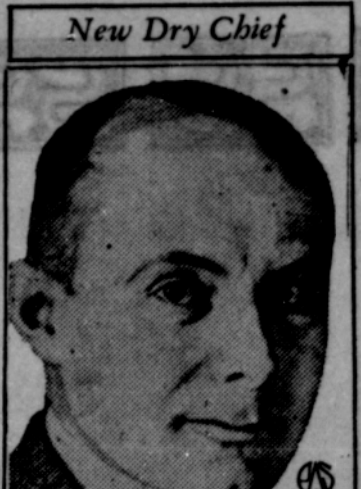

A STUDY IN 'AUTOMOBILE CONTRASTS



"Mother and Twins" might be the title for this photograph, which shows one of the new motor stages recently put into service by Union Pacific Stages and a couple of the little American Austins which have been creating interest in automobile circles. The motor stage weighs 18,000 pounds while the Austin tips the scales at only 1134 pounds. An average load for the big fellow is about 4,500 pounds while the little car is designed to carry a maximum load of about 600

pounds. A new tire for the stage sets the Union Pacific Stages company back about \$100, while the Austin people claim the cost of tires for their equipment will average about \$6.90 for 25,000 miles. The motor stage shown above is the last word in modern stage equipment and is helping the company to maintain frequent schedules on all divisions of a constantly growing stage operation, according to W. L. McCrea

The stage company now maintains direct service to Chicago, New York and all eastern points and serves a large portion of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Utah.
