The catch in this is the definition of "urban" and "rural." The government's position is the arbitrary one that any community with more than 2500 inhabitants is "urban"

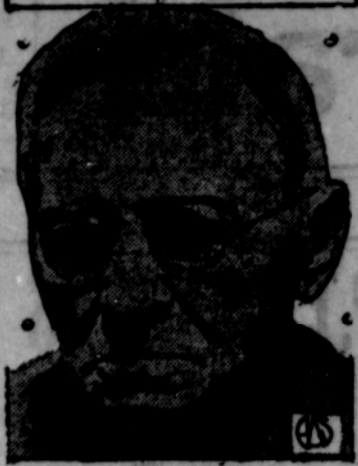
Certainly there are thousands of communities of more than 2500 population whose interests are still rural, whose inhabitants have not got the big city point of view on any of the important matters of manners

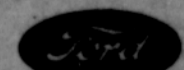
