Controversy Ended by "Mason and Dixon" Line As a boundary division the "Mason and Dixon" line got its name from the two men who surveyed and established it, Charles Mason and John Dixon. It was run by agreement between the Calvert, of Maryland, and William Penn to settle a controversy regarding the boundary line between Pennsylvania and Maryland. Mason and Dixon came from England in 1764 for that express purpose. They were both men of scientific attainments, Mason at one time being assistant at the royal observatory at Greenwich. They ran the line with great care, cutting a space eight feet wide through the forest and setting up a stone at the end of each mile. Every fifth stone was larger than the others and had on the north side the arms of William Penn and on the south those of Lord Baltimore. The smaller, intermediate stones had the letter "P" on the north surface and "M" on the south, for Pennsylvania and Maryland. The line has nothing to do with slavery, except as it ultimately became the boundary line between free states and the slave, though that was not the thought at the time. When the line was established slavery existed in Pennsylvania as it did in the colonies, and was not abolished in Pennsylvania until 1780 and then only by a law providing that all colored persons thereafter born within the state should be set free at the age of twenty-eight years.

How Venice Procured Body of Patron Saint For many years Venice was the center of the most enlightened government and one of the most powerful states in Italy. Although her geography and her buildings have a unique fascination, her history is the most romantic and picturesque aspect of all. The story of St. Mark, her patron saint, is a daring and exciting one. In the year 827 A. D. a Venetian ship lying in the harbor of Alexandria was commanded by three men, Rustico of Torcello, Buono of Malamocco and one Stauracio, who were animated by the felonious but pious purpose of depriving the city of its most valuable possession—the body of St. Mark. After much argument and bribery they induced the guardian of the tomb to become a party to their design. Thus St. Mark was brought with great ceremony to Venice, there to be given a magnificent reception and to become her patron saint.

Beggars Once Licensed Licenses to beg for the ransoms of Christians captured by the Turks were common long before Queen Elizabeth's reign. As early as 1517 a list compiled of the beggars and poor of each ward in London numbered over 1,000. To the persons on this list were issued the first beggars' licenses—round tin badges with the arms of the city of London stamped upon them. Every one else was forbidden to beg, under penalty of death. Those who had badges were expected to do a little police work by helping to drive any foreign competition out of town.

Dieting Not a New Fad There is in existence an illustration bearing the date of 1614 which proves to us that even so long ago there was an interest in diet. At that time one Sanctonius built himself a weighing chair so that he could see just how much food he ate daily. This chair was an ingenious device connected with a high steel rod on which there was a movable weight. The weight was pushed over to equal the weight of himself and the food he was about to eat. Then sitting in this chair he would eat until the chair dipped, when he would end his repast.

Queensland "Rainmakers" In Queensland rainmakers use a rain stick—a piece of wood 20 inches long to which three rain stones have been attached. The rainmakers go to a lonely pool, one of them fixes the rain stick in a hollow log, and everybody leaps in the water and splashes it. On the way home the men scratch their shins and the tops of their heads with twigs. No woman may set eyes on the rain stick, although the wife of the chief rainmaker is permitted to scratch her shins with a twig if she cares to.

12 Noon and 12 Midnight Twelve o'clock noon is almost universally written 12 m., the m. being the abbreviation of meridian, the accusative of the Latin merides, which means midday. The proper designation of midnight is 12 p. m. But it is often seen written 12 n., for noon, and 12 m., for midnight. These abbreviations are confusing and should not be used. To avoid confusion, the abbreviations should be dispensed with and the designation written 12 noon and 12 midnight.
