

TO THE WATER USERS OF THE HERMISTON IRRIGATION DISTRICT

I am a candidate for director on the district board. Six years ago I was elected director for a three year term. Things were in a bad way. We had to have relief or lose our homes. I was in the thickest of the fight for relief which was finally obtained.

My opponent in this race was not sympathetic with the relief movement and refused to accept the relief allowed, going ahead on the old payment plan. Under the relief law the settlers took over the handling of the project. The first year the board cut the running expenses of the project nine thousand (\$9,000) dollars.

With a greatly reduced force of employees, our manager has been most efficient, our office records, extremely accurate, and our ditch riders on the whole have rendered better service than ever before. Our present board is handling things well. It is agreed that the past six years has been the smoothest running period the project has ever known. Does it seem wise to allow any disturbing force to enter now? I believe to cut expenses thousands of dollars per year. We can cut more. Economy must be followed at every turn of the road. We must keep up our system and render good service on an economical basis.

I favor giving to the public every detail of project expenditures and of activities of the board. The public often does not realize the problems faced by the board. I do not favor an unduly large reserve fund raised by increased O. and M. charges. We as individuals are still borrowers and not lenders. This project is made by the people who follow the plow, carry the shovel, milk the cows and feed the chickens. We must keep things moving smoothly and economically and the future looks better for us. The red tape on our construction charge has not yet been cut by congress.

As a member of the board I will fight without rest or limit till our construction charge is wiped off forever.

No stone will be left unturned in accomplishing this.

NOTICE OF SCHOOL MEETING

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN to the legal voters of School District No. 14, of Umatilla County, State of Oregon, that a SCHOOL MEETING of said district will be held at the School Building on the 22nd day of November, 1930, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon for the purpose of discussing the budget hereinafter set out with the levying board, and to vote on the proposition of levying a special district tax.

The total amount of money needed by the said school district during the fiscal year beginning on June 16, 1930, and ending June 17, 1931, is estimated in the following budget and includes the amounts to be received from the county school fund, state school fund, elementary school fund, special district tax, and all other moneys of the district.

When the budget meeting is held in connection with the annual school meeting, the following provision of section 232, School Laws 1929, should be observed: "Until the ballots are counted at least one hour after the time set for the meeting in districts of the second and third classes, any legal voter of the district shall be entitled to vote upon matters before the meeting."
