

## CITY COUNCIL PASSES RADIO ORDINANCE LAST MEETING

PROVIDES FOR MINIMIZING RADIO INTERFERENCE

Unlawful For Any Person To Operate Electrical Apparatus Which Interfers With Broadcast

At the last regular meeting of the city council a radio ordinance was passed which provides for minimizing radio interference, for the operation of certain electrical devices; for the duration of said permits and the method of applying therefor; for the inspection of electrical apparatus and for the entry into buildings for the making of inspection; and provides penalties.

It shall be unlawful for any person to operate in the city of Hermiston any apparatus generating or causing high frequency oscillations which interfere with radio broadcast transmitting or receiving apparatus, without a permit to use the same.

Anyone desiring to operate any apparatus coming within the terms of the ordinance shall file a written application with the City Recorder who will then pass it on to the city council who shall accept or reject each application by motion. The fee for application shall be \$1.00 for one machine and fifty cents for each additional machine.

According to the ordinance, any person who violates any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine not exceeding \$100 or by imprisonment in the city jail for a period not exceeding 60 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

H. W. Kelley, city constable, has been testing machines the past several days and it would be wise for any owner of such machines to have him test their apparatus.

### O. P. SMITH

November 29, 1930 marked the passing away of another member of the sturdy band of pioneers that settled the west, when Mr. O. P. Smith died at the Hermiston hospital after a long illness caused by heart trouble.

Mr. Smith was born in Missouri April 5, 1887, and at the age of two years was a member of a company of home seekers coming to California in a large ox train. April 30, 1898, found him back in Idaho and wed to Miss Grace Willhite of Boise. Mrs. Edna Leslie Tilden of Hermiston was the only child born to this union.

The family came to Hermiston in September, 1918, and at that time united with the Hermiston Baptist church and have taken an active interest in the church and civic affairs since that time. Mr. Smith will long be remembered for his fine Christian spirit and his patience in suffering. A host of friends join his wife and daughter in their sorrow over the loss of their loved one.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at 1 o'clock at the Evans Funeral Parlor after which the body was taken to Pendleton where interment was made in the cemetery in that city.

### CANDIDATES TO ANNAPOLIS CHOSEN BY EXAMINATION

Congressman Robert R. Butler announces that he will arrange for a competitive examination open to all qualified young men in his district on January 10, 1931, to fill two vacancies which will occur in 1931 in the Naval Academy at Annapolis. The mental tests for designation to the Naval Academy will be conducted by the U. S. Civil Service commission Saturday, January 10, 1931, at 9 a. m., at the post office in the following cities in the Second Congressional district of Oregon: Baker, Bend, Klamath Falls, La Grande, Pendleton and The Dalles.

The candidates will be examined in Algebra plain geometry, English composition, literature, United States history, Ancient history and physics. Congressman Butler will appoint the two candidates receiving the highest ratings in this test as determined by the Civil Service Commission principal midshipmen.

Those wishing to enter this competition should immediately write Congressman Butler at Washington, D. C., so that they may be listed to take the examination and should also inform the congressman in which city they desire to take the examination. Those requesting it will be sent a circular of information regarding the scope of the examination in the different branches.

## COW TESTING REPORT FOR NOVEMBER

AVERAGE PRODUCTION PER COW  
22.6 POUNDS BUTTERFAT

C. M. Jackson, Hawley Bean, Alpha Christley and A. R. Coppock Have High Herds for November.

The November report of the Umatilla Dairy Herd Improvement association just completed by the association tester, Willard Kernkamp, shows an average production of 22.6 pounds of butterfat per cow for all the cows of the association.

There were 63 of the 580 cows enrolled that made over 40 pounds of butterfat for the month of November.

C. M. Jackson, with his herd of 6 grade Jerseys, was high this month with an average of 843 pounds of milk and 45.7 pounds butterfat. Hawley J. Bean ran him a close second with his herd of purebred Holsteins which averaged 937 pounds of milk and 42.6 pounds of butterfat.

Alpha Christley had the high herd of over 20 cows with an average production of 30.8 pounds of butterfat per cow. A. R. Coppock of Adams in the next class of from 12 to 20 cows, had a herd average of 31.4 pounds of butterfat per cow.

Hawley Bean of Echo had the two high cows of the association for the month of November, both being pure bred Holsteins, one producing 66.9 pounds of fat this month and the other producing 64.3 pounds fat.

Hawley Bean and C. M. Jackson both had cows making 45 pounds of fat thus qualifying them for the honor roll in class B.

C. M. Jackson, F. A. Baker, S. R. Cooper, Hawley Bean, O. Coryell and George Winn had cows that deserve honorable mention in Class C, as they made over 40 pounds of fat during November.

In class D, A. Christley, W. G. Webber, Sylvan Pierson, A. W. Acock, J. H. Reid and C. M. Jackson had cows making the honor roll.

### BOARD OF DIRECTORS HOLD MEETING DECEMBER 1ST

Growers To Receive Notices As To Time Their Birds Will Be Received Here

The next shipment of turkeys from this district will take place next Monday and Tuesday, December 8 and 9th, according to Ernest M. Lauer, assistant county agent. Contrary to previous expectations, this will probably be the only shipment before the Christmas holidays, as a large number of birds are not fully mature yet, and two shipments would be quite expensive unless a sufficient volume was available.

The board of directors of the Eastern Oregon Turkey Growers association met last Monday night at the Assistant County Agent's office to formulate plans for this coming shipment with special consideration to ironing out the objectionable features of the last pool.

In order to prevent congestion and confusion at the receiving station, it was decided to send notices to each grower indicating half-day in which the birds would be received at the station.

The board of directors also decided that no more members would be accepted until after the shipment. At the last pool new members were accepted even on the receiving day, which brought in an unexpectedly large number of birds, and resulted in a great deal of confusion due to lack of preparation for the unexpected volume. By refusing to accept any new members a close estimate can be obtained in the volume to be handled, and preparations made to handle it efficiently.

Lyle Tilden was hired by the board to act as manager of the receiving station under the direction of J. J. Jendrzejewski, president of the association.
