**BIOLOGICAL SURVEY SHOWS
LARGE NUMBER COYOTES KILLED**

During November 33 hunters worked all or part time and took 215 coyotes, 5 bobcats, 3 mountain lions, 2 predatory bears, a total of 229 predatory animals. In addition, 116 porcupines were destroyed by hunters. The hunters who made the largest catches during November are:

Walter Sutherland, Harney, 1 bobcat, 18 coyotes; Robert Long, Malheur, 14 coyotes; Harry Stokes, Josephine, 10 coyotes, 2 lions; Robert Palmer, Wheeler, 1 bobcat, 11 coy-

otes; Chas. Glasgow, Klamath, 1 bobcat, 10 coyotes; Bart Robbs, Umatilla, 11 coyotes; Albert Kinnison, Union, 11 coyotes; Albert Shoemaker, Baker, 1 bobcat, 9 coyotes; Edgar Watkins, Grant, 2 bobcats, 8 coyotes; Muriel Jacobs, Lake, 1 bobcat, 9 coyotes; Clifford DeBok, Umatilla, 1 bobcat, 9 coyotes.

During the month, Harry Stokes of Josephine county made a most notable catch, taking a total of ten coyotes and two cougars. Both the big cats were shot from the same tree at the same time.

The stormy weather of mid-November muddled up the traps considerably but poison work on open desert ranges continued with good success, most of the men turning in good reports, but a few fell down badly with the number of animals reported taken.

During the recent annual meeting of the Oregon Woolgrowers association at Burns, the stockmen endorsed the work in very complimentary terms.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

International Sunday school lesson for December 14.

"Saul of Tarsus." Acts 22:3-15.

A person can be conscientious and wrong. This was illustrated in Saul of Tarsus, than whom there was no more positive Pharisee. He was devout and faithful in all that he understood to be right.

Saul had been especially honored in being entrusted with letters of authority and accompanying soldiery that he might proceed to Damascus and bring those who confessed faith in Jesus Christ there back to Jerusalem for trial. He was in such haste to reach his destination that when he neared Damascus as noon approached he refrained from the usual mid-day siesta that he might the more speedily arrive at his destination and begin the investigation. Then the miracle occurred that that changed his entire viewpoint.

Above the brightness of the noon day sun there was a manifestation of the glory of God in the open heaven. Others were aware of the vision but they did not hear the voice that demanded of Saul "Why persecutest thou me?"

Glory from the throne had blinded the man who a moment before had been so sure of himself. He had to yield himself to the hand of another as entrance was made into the city. Then came three days of meditation and personal communion with the Lord, in Whom he now believed

**HOGS PREFER RAW FOOD
SAYS NEW O. A. C. REPORT**

Man may like his food cooked, but the lowly swine has different ideas in the matter and will do about 10 per cent better on raw feed. The one exception is potatoes, according to a new bulletin on fattening pigs for market, written by A. W. Oliver and E. L. Potter and just published by the Oregon Experiment station.

The bulletin lists all the common feeds for pigs and rates them in comparison with ground barley, the principal hog feed in Oregon. Wheat, corn and barley are listed as equal in value as concentrates for hogs. The bulletin is for free distribution.
