Al Jolson in "Mammy" A Warner Bros. Production

"Mammy" the current featured attraction at the Oasis theatre, where in Warner-Brothers offer Al Jolson in his fourth and greatest picture, is the most Jolsonesque of all his productions. Xmas eve and Xmas night.

Famous for his burnt cork artistry, "Mammy" gives him a chance to sing most of his songs, as end-man in a minstrel show, in black face.

He is famous for the popularizing of "Mammy" in song and story and in this picture he has given the title to Mammy and has brought her into being for the first time, in a role exquisitely played by Louise Dresser. Jolson's stage confidences and stories are at their readiest and the play

is packed full of songs and situations built just for him. "Mammy" is adapted from a stage play written by Irving Berlin expressly for Jolson. It is material that no other star could use to such an advantage. Title, story and songs fit Jolson like the proverbial glove.

Remarkable photography of one of the West's finest scenic areas, a story of unsurpassed action and realism, the noted Warner Baxter in his greatest "handit" role, a splendid supporting cast and unusual direction all feature "The Arizona Kid," the current talkie sensation at the Oasis theatre Friday and Saturday.

When previous Western talkies have had their various interior scenes filmed at the studio after shooting the outdoor sequences, Director Alfred Santell made every foot of film on the exact location of the story—a little town on the southern edge of Zion National park, Utah. The abandoned "ghost city" of Grafton, washed away by a flood in 1882, was rebuilt by Fox Movietone experts into an exact replica of the town as it was in the eighties. Several carloads of gasoline-electric generators and lights were shipped to the nearest

railroad point, 90 miles away, and trucked to the location to provide illumination for the interior scenes, filmed inside the reconstructed buildings themselves, thus achieving a realism impossible under old conditions.

Mona Maris, the Argentine beauty, who created such a sensation with Baxter in "Romance of Rio Grande," is again seen as the leading lady in this production. Other important roles in the picture are enacted by Carol Lombard and Mrs. Jiminez.

In former pictures, Janet Gaynor has either been very poor and Charles Farrell very rich, or vice versa, or both have been very poor. In "High Society Blues," Fox Movietone musical romance, their newest vehicle which opens at the Oasis theatre next Sunday, both are unusually wealthy, although there is a wide gap in their social positions.

Miss Gaynor, a society debutante, however, does not let snobbery interfere with her interest in Farrell, although her social position is far less than hers.

William Collier Sr., Joyce Compton, Hedda Hopper, Louise Fazenda, Lucien Littlefield and Brandon Hurst are also prominent.
