HERMISTON SCHOOLS THIRD IN PER CAPITA COST

A state financial report of per capita cost for school operations shows Hermiston Union high school third lowest for 1929-1930, with Pendleton second and Athena first. Hermiston high school per capita cost was \$178.74 and the lowest figure was \$161.19. The highest figure per capita cost shows \$609.75. According to Superintendent Shaw there has been an enrollment increase of 17 per cent during the past year which will lower the per capita cost for Hermiston schools during 1931.
