THEATRE NOTES

There have been great aviation pictures in the past; but there has never been one like "The Dawn Patrol."

This latest First National and Vitaphone Picture, starring Richard Barthelmess, Sunday and Monday at the Oasis theatre, stands without doubt in a class by itself as a drama of war in the air. For thrills, chills, terrors, triumphs and the sweep of sheer reality, this picture seems to the present reviewer to be without a peer.

A great cast supports Barthelmess in a great story. Such names as those of Douglas Fairbanks, Jr., Neil Hamilton, Clyde Cook, Gardner James and Frank McHugh speak for themselves. It is an all-masculine cast, by the way, and the plot is a story filled with an iron quality of masculinity that exerts in irresistible power over

the spectator. Here, at last, is the real thing. Here is the war as it was actually fought in France in those desperate years which saw the sacrifice of so many brave young lives. Here is a ceaselessly moving panorama of the great tragic drama of actuality which shook the civilization of the twentieth century to its foundations.

The utmost resources of a great modern studio, and the best efforts of many skilled and gifted men, have been expended upon it.

SCHOOL NOTES

The Hermiston schools are getting well settled into a quite ambitious program of speech training; the high school under the direction of Mr. Henry N. Harger and the elementary grades guided by Miss Eleanor Daily. The high school will enter a team of four in the Umatilla District of the Oregon Debating League, and in addition will enter a contestant in the National Oratorical Contest, as well as compete in the Oregon State College Extemporaneous and Interpretive speaking. Final entries will be made in the four divisions of the Umatilla County High School Oratorical Contest. In the grade school representatives of the lower division (third, fourth and fifth grades) and the upper division (sixth, seventh, and eighth grades) will meet other schools for county honors.

This year there will be just two kinds of declamations for the elementary pupils, humorous and non-humorous. Since each school is allowed one contestant from each division in humorous and one in non-humorous, Hermiston elementary school will be represented in the sectional contest by two pupils from the lower division and two from the upper division. Another change effective this year is the method of timing. At the end of the allotted time the timing judges will rap and the speaker must immediately retire. This rule was not thoroughly understood last year, and resulted in some confusion, but this year it will be strictly enforced as stated above.

The dates for the sectional contest have not yet been set by Superintendent Fitzpatrick of Echo, Sectional Director. The county contest will be held on Saturday, April 4, the Inter-County at Heppner, April 18, and the state meeting on April 23 and 24. This year the county contests will all be held on one day, Saturday. That is the elementary speakers will meet in the afternoon, and the high school in the evening. It is expected the sectional contest will be conducted in like manner.

Each year the winners in the county meeting are barred for the next succeeding year, and those barred this year are as follows: Elementary grades: Makers of the Flag, Wings, Sister Caroline's Speaking, Freedom or Slavery, The Highwayman, and Sis Hopkins. High school: Spartacus' Address to the Slaves, They Grind Exceedingly Fine and The Dutch Orator.

At a meeting in Pendleton last Saturday plans were laid for county activities in spring sports. A County Board of Control, consisting of Thos. Bleakney, principal of the Umatilla Schools; Wm. E. King, Principal of Griswold Union High School; R. A. Nixon, Principal of the Pilot Rock Union High School; Frank E. Shaw, Principal of the Hermiston Union High School; and Superintendent Austin Landreth of the Pendleton Public Schools, was named. The Control Board has agreed to hold a Saturday morning track meet for county high schools excepting Pendleton and McLoughlin High Schools. In the afternoon of the same Saturday a dual meet between Pendleton and McLoughlin will be run off simultaneously with the annual grade school county track meet. Preceding these county meets sectional meets will be held at several centers, one of which is Hermiston.

New students at Hermiston Union High School are Burt Young and Alicia Ouellette, the former entering from the Sunnyside elementary school of Portland, Oregon, and the latter as a transfer from Kelso, Washington, high school. Young is a freshman and Miss Ouellette is a junior.

Freshmen put over their first class project with complete success when they sold the very last piece of candy at their candy sale last Saturday evening. The sale was a side issue to the Hermiston-Helix basketball game. Incidentally, the absentees missed one of the very best basketball games of the year when they failed to attend last Saturday's game. The attendance was poor nevertheless, little more than enough to pay the referee being taken in at the door.

The high school paper The Examiner has outgrown its present managers, the Junior class, and a new editorial staff was elected Wednesday afternoon under the head of the Journalism club as follows: Chester Johnson, editor; Edwin Throop managing editor; Grace Rodda, news editor; Gladys Swarner, sports editor; Bob Henderson, feature editor; Leona Dyer, miscellaneous editor; Margaret Felthouse, secretary and Miss Elliott faculty adviser.

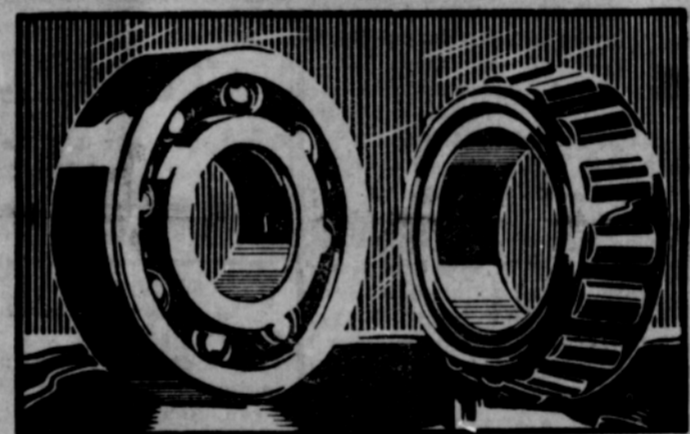
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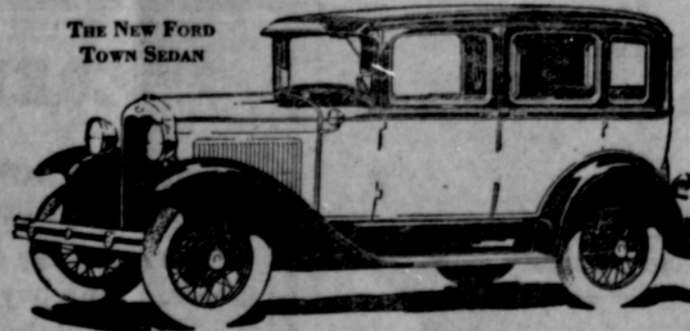
