WITH FARMERS AROUND THE STATE

Oregon City—Unless the public buying power is very low, 1931 should prove a profitable strawberry year in Clackamas county. Word just received from the U. S. department of agriculture by J. J. Inskeep, county agent, indicates that the strawberry acreage in the United States is 12 per cent below the five year average. Decreased acreage in the east and the south is caused by low prices for the past two years, and by dry hot weather.

Dallas—The interest of Polk county farmers in progressive, improved methods of farming is indicated, by the fact that out of 1900 farmers in the county, 1119 attended one or more educational meetings and demonstrations on various phases of agriculture during the past year, reports County Agent J. R. Beck.

Corvallis—List of all Oregon growers having certified grain, grass, alfalfa and Ladino clover seed for sale are being made out by E. R. Jackson, specialist in farm crops at Oregon State college, and will soon be available from county agents.

Klamath Falls—Indications are that the potato acreage in Klamath county will be considerably increased in 1931, as potatoes are the only crop at this time returning an income above the cost of production, says C. A. Henderson, county agent. Total shipments from this county so far this year are about 1650 cars, with approximately 400 cars on hand, and a large amount in the dealers' possession. Considerable storage loss has been experienced, Henderson says, due to mechanical injury and field frost, and an educational campaign for the improvement of handling and storage practices is contemplated.
