JESUS BEARS GOOD TIDINGS

Luke 8:1-15

THE GOLDEN TEXT

"Soul" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, Feb. 15.

The Golden Text was, "I have longed for thy salvation, O Lord; and thy law is my delight. Let my soul live, and it shall praise thee; and let thy judgments help me" (Ps. 119:174, 175).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon also included the following from the Bible: "But the Jews did not believe concerning him, that he had been blind, and received his sight. . . He answered and said, . . . one thing I know, that, whereas I was blind, now I see" (John 9:18, 25).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures", by Mary Baker Eddy: "As used in Christian Science, Soul is properly the synonym of Spirit, or God." "Knowing that Soul and its attributes were forever manifested through man, the Master healed the sick, gave sight to the blind, hearing to the deaf, feet to the lame, thus bringing to light the scientific action of the divine Mind on human minds and bodies and giving a better understanding of Soul and salvation" (pp. 482 and 219).

it is said there were over 200 cities and villages in Galilee and the population numbered two or three millions. The condition is decidedly different today, though the number will be largely increased soon if the Hebrews continue to return and reestablish themselves in their Promised Land.

Many parables are given at this time which tell about the Kingdom of Heaven that Jesus came to establish. A definition that is still good calls a parable a heavenly story with an earthly meaning.
