Notice to Settlers

On account of the probability of Cold Springs Reservoir being filled to capacity with stored water on or about March 15, and in order that the project may derive the greatest possible benefit from the flood waters of the Umatilla river, the Hermiston Irrigation District Board of Directors have adopted a policy for the year 1931 which will make it possible for all water right lands on the project, having paid their charges for last season, to thoroughly saturate the soil with this surplus water. Accordingly, the date for operation and maintenance payment has been set for May 5, 1931. Water will be in the Canals and laterals by March 15. All lands on the project eligible for water, under this ruling, are urged to irrigate early in order that the ground water table may be brought up through the application of this flood water now available.

We believe a great saving can be affected, not only in the protection it gives to our stored water, but that more returns can be secured from the lands here if the policy of early irrigation is generally practiced.

Reports covering the entire north-west point to a general shortage of irrigation water for this season, due to this fact all settlers are especially urged to keep their ditches well cleaned and to carefully prepare their land in order that the water can be as beneficially used as possible through the entire season.

No water will be delivered to farm units not having their operation and maintenance charge paid by May 5, 1931.

REPORT OF COUNTY HEALTH NURSE SHOWS EXTENSIVE WORK

Total number of investigative visits, 67; Total number of instructive visits, 99; Total number miscellaneous and other visits, 151; Total number mileage, 1843.

Towns visited: Pendleton, Adams, Athena, Weston, Milton-Freewater, Freewater-Ferndale, Tumalum, Riverside, Mission, Reith, Echo, Stanfield, Hermiston, Pleasant View, Thornhollow, Pilot Rock, Columbia Grove, No. 43 and 53, Portland.

The following report covers the months of January and February, as the county nurse was in Portland February first.

Eight dental surveys were conducted by local dentists at different schools over the country; 178 grade pupils, at Hermiston, were examined by Dr. F. V. Prime and Dr. W. L. Morgan, Dr. R. D. Blatchford, of Athena, cooperated in the health work by examining the grade children of Adams, Athena, and Weston. Dr. O. T. Harstad of Freewater, examined the pupils of the Freewater school and Dr. S. E. Allen of Pendleton, accompanied the county nurse to Riverside, Mission, and Reith, to examine the children in those schools. A total of 693 grade and high school pupils benefited by this service; 528 grade and 13 high school students were found to have dental defects.

The following schools were visited and the routine examination was given the pupils by the county nurse: Grove and Central schools in Milton,

Pilot Rock, Echo, Mission, Reith, Riverside, Fruitvale, Adams, Weston, and school district No. 53. The last named school had been visited during the first week of the fall semester but, contrary to its usual custom, it did not open until a week later; 759 children in all were examined.

A five-year old child was taken by the county nurse to the Doernbecher Hospital, Portland, for an operation for hernia.

Application for admission to the same hospital was filed for a three-year old Indian child.

An application for admission of a boy of nineteen was filed at the Eastern Oregon Tuberculosis hospital at The Dalles. These papers were made out by Dr. J. A. Best, Umatilla County health officer, who examined the lad, and were then sent to the county judge of Gilliam county for his endorsement as the patient is a legal resident of that county.

On February 20, the annual meeting of the Umatilla County Public Health Association was held at the Umatilla County library, Pendleton, with approximately 50 members present. We really expected more as our secretary, Mrs. J. P. Stewart, had mailed over 250 invitations. There were several other important meetings which occurred on the same date, so that probably accounts for the smaller number at our meeting.

Mrs. J. P. Stewart was elected president, Mrs. James Hill, vice-president; Mrs. George Stangler, secretary, and Mrs. Herbert Decker, treasurer.

Mrs. Sadie Orr-Dunbar, executive

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secretary of the Oregon Tuberculosis Association, came from Portland for the event and gave a very interesting talk on organization and health problems, which made clearer the work of our county association. We were much disappointed that Mrs. Glendora Blakely, whom we had expected to be with us, was unable, at the last minute, to come because of a 50 per cent cut in the amount requested by the State Bureau of Nursing and Child Hygiene. Later in the evening we rejoiced to learn through the newspaper column that the appropriation for the bureau was raised from \$11,350 to \$17,500.
