## Poultry Outlook Painted Bright

ing and fired from the outside. Four lengths of tiling run through the concrete and merge into one at the base of the chimney. Another pipe runs over the concrete on the inside, keeping a proper temperature, which is regulated by the movement of the chicks. When too warm they spread out and if cold they hoover under the pipe. With only a portion of the floor heated it gives the chicks an opportunity to regulate their own comfort. After the concrete is once

heated the furnace fire can go for 12 hours without a diminish temperature. J. W. McMullen is only other poultry raiser on the subject who uses the same system.

Mr. Reid's two buildings in which he houses his 1450 flock have inches of straw under a light roofing which serves as a protect in the event of a severe winter sun. He has planted trees along south side as protection for the and sun. Trap nests are of wire, are portable. As the eggs are they roll into a trap where they be gathered without entering building. These nests are sanitary and prevent worry from dirty trapped eggs.
