NEW MOTOR VEHICLE LAWS EFFECTIVE JUNE 6th

New laws affecting motor vehicle operation will go into effect on June 6th, which is the end of the constitutional 90-day period following the close of the legislative session. Exceptions are the law on the examination of drivers, which will become effective on the first of July, and the formation of the state police, effective on the first of August.

The principal changes in the rules of the road, effective in June, are the new speed regulations; the change in the arm signaling system, and the right-of-way privileges at intersections. "All of these changes are important," says Secretary of State Hal Hoss, "and from time to time it will be the purpose of my office to send out information to the public covering each of these specific phases of the new laws."

"I opposed the inclusion of the state traffic patrol in the criminal law enforcing work of the new state police, based on the experience of other states having constabularies. They are practically all operating with separate traffic patrols, but the Oregon legislature was almost unanimous for consolidation, and the state traffic division as such will cease to exist on August 1st. I am assured by Governor Meier that he intends

to keep all competent officers for service in the new organization. I have had the satisfaction of seeing the traffic division attain a high place in the regard of the motoring public, and a number of my own aims and objectives for the betterment of the service have been reached. The division is on a completely harmonious and cooperative basis; the officers are better qualified and better equipped than they have ever been; we have established a checking and reporting system covering over two thousand miles of highways with nearly 200 individual stations; our "white fleet" has proved itself as an effective patrol accessory; we have been able to reduce highway accidents in the face of a national increase; and our relations with all law enforcing agencies of the state are harmonious and effective."

MARINE CORPS RESUME RECRUITING FOR APPLICANTS

Orders have been received by the officer in charge of Marine Corps recruiting for the states of Oregon, Washington and Idaho to resume recruiting for applicants for general service.

Applicants for enlistment must be 19 years of age and not over 30; at least 56 inches in height; of good character and able to pass the required physical and mental examina-

tions. Men for band duty must be at least 64 inches in height; 18 years of age or over and qualified to pass the same examinations as are required for general service; and in addition pass the required musical examination. All applicants are transferred to the Marine corps base at San Diego, California, where they

receive their military training after which they are transferred to one of the many Marine corps posts in foreign countries or in the United States. The Marine corps recruiting station is located in room 430 Worcester building, 3rd and Oak streets, Portland, Oregon.
