VITAMIN D NECESSARY IN HOG RATION, SAYS O.S.C.

Pigs need their vitamin D just as much as humans do, says A. W. Oliver, assistant professor of animal husbandry at Oregon State college. Instead of getting it from the cod-liver oil bottle, however, the pig is usually dependent on sunshine and on alfalfa leaves, grass and other green plants for its source of supply.

In a recent experiment conducted at the college, Professor Oliver found that pigs which were excluded from sunlight and fed on a ration of barley and tankage exhibited marked

nutrition deficiencies after seven weeks. One pig died of pneumonia, some showed symptoms of rickets, and others became stiff and crampy. Alfalfa leaf meal was then added to the ration and within a week the evidence of malnutrition had practically disappeared, Oliver says.
