CLEAN GROUND IS TURKEY

"CURE-ALL"; EXPERIMENT MADE

Disease control in turkeys is very largely dependent on raising the birds on lean ground. The spending

of money for poultry tonics, worm or cure-all remedies is unnecessary and largely useless.

This is one of the conclusions drawn by H. K. Dean, superintendent of the Umatilla branch experiment station, at the end of the first year of an experiment in raising disease free turkeys by keeping them under semi-confinement on clean ground all their lives.

The turkeys were obtained as day-old pullets, brooded in well-ventilated 12 by 12 house, using a commercial chick brooder. When old enough to leave the brooder they were kept on alfalfa pasture until the alfalfa growth ceased in the fall. The lot fences were moved five times during the season, and each plot of ground was used only once.

Of the flock of 250 birds started in this experiment, losses to maturity were as follows: from paralysis or leg weakness 4, indigestion 2, blackhead 6, accidents 2 and unknown causes 2. Four of those dying from blackhead contracted the disease while left for a short time on ground on which chicken manure had been applied and plowed under the previous spring.

In addition to mash and grain, separate hoppers containing grit, bone meal, oyster shell and charcoal were available on the range at all times, and after the green alfalfa season was over alfalfa meal was added to the mash.

"The turkey industry of the United States has moved from the east to the west largely because of losses from disease sustained by growers when their soils become contaminated," said Dean. "The industry in the west has been successful primarily because it has been conducted on clean ground. If it is to continue so, steps must be taken to prevent disease."

LA GRANDE—Irrigation water in being applied this year to 12½ acres of land on the Lee Wright farm in Fruitdale, which, Mr. Wright says, has never been profitable under dry farming methods. The land was surveyed, mapped and laid out by County Agent H. G. Avery. Most of the field will be seeded to alfalfa and potatoes.

THE RICH MAN AND LAZARUS
Luke 16:19-31

Jesus kept on teaching by means of parables as he made His way through Peres, enroute to Jerusalem for the Feast of Passover. Some had just "scoffed at him" and He purposed to show them more about true and abiding values. The "certain rich man" is without an indited name. We call him Dives because there; we have the Latin word for rich. He was the kind to stir up class antagonism. He would not have given any thing of value to help the man out of employment during the winter through which we have just passed. He lived to eat and made himself a candidate for gout by the way in which he "fared sumptuously every day." Though he did not invite ever his fellow aristocrats to share in the banquets this selfish vagabond sat clothed in garments suitable for a king.

If he looked at the beggar who lay at his gate it was with disdain. There was Lazarus, the man full of sores and attended during the day by dogs only. WITH FARMERS AROUND THE STATE
Eugene—Orders for Bortfield turnip seed are being pooled through the county agent's office for farmers of western Lane county. This variety of turnips was introduced recently by the Astoria branch of the Oregon Experiment station, and has

proved popular and successful in the coast region.
DALLAS—A group of four meetings to be held during the month in Spring Valley, Oak Point, Bethel and Salt Creek communities have been arranged by County Agent J. R. Beck to demonstrate to farmers of these districts the best methods of poisoning pocket gophers. These rodents constitute an unusually ser-

ious menace to clover and alfalfa fields this year, Mr. Beck says, because they have been able to work throughout the entire winter.
CANYON CITY—Seedlings of Ladak and Grimm alfalfa on the Prairie City alfalfa nursery came through the winter without damage, while Arizona Common and Argentina alfalfa froze out 100 per cent, reports County Agent R. G. Johnson.
