Westland Irrigation District Notice of Election

STATE CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR CONVENTION AT MEDFORD

The forty-first State Christian Endeavor convention will be held in Medford, April 23-26, 1931, and will be attended by young people from all over the state, according to present indications. The sessions will be held in the First Presbyterian Church of Medford, beginning with the evening session, Thursday, April 23 and concluding Sunday evening, April 26. James C. Henderson, of Portland, State President, will preside. The singing of the convention promises to be outstanding, led by Claude Neely, director in the First Christian Church of Portland. Two pianos will be used, and excellent pianists have been secured. The opening address and two other of the convention addresses will be delivered by Dr. George H. Scofield, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Walla Walla. Dr. Scofield attended world conventions in London and Berlin and has been a vice-president in the New York State Christian Endeavor Union until his recent coming to Walla Walla. Dr. Grover C. Birtchet, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Salem, will conduct Bible studies and will also tell of his work in the mission field in Columbia, South America. Dr. Birtchet is an Oregon man and is a graduate of Albany college. Dr. Victor P. Morris, one of the professors in the department of economics in the State University in Eugene, and pastor of the Christian Church in Monmouth, will deliver the Sunday afternoon address and have other parts. Dr. Morris is also an Oregon man, has a P.H.D. degree from Columbia University and is one of the most sought educators of the state for public addresses. Dr. Walter L. Myers of Eugene, well-known Christian Endeavor, college and Y.M.C.A. man, will also conduct Bible studies and have other parts in the program. Practical conferences on the work of Christian Endeavor, banquets, sight seeing tours, parade, missionary playlet contest and other novel features will make it one of the most attractive conventions held in the history of the movement in the state. Special cars will be put on a regular train, stopping at many places in the Willamette Valley to take on delegations of Endeavorers bound for the convention.

You'll see all of these funny air scenes in "Going Wild" at the Oasia theatre. Besides Joe E. Brown, Ona Munson, Laura Lee, Lawrence Gray and Frank McHugh are in the cast. "Girl of the Golden West," which comes to the Oasis theatre Thursday and Saturday as a First National and Vitaphone production, is considered David Belasco's outstanding theatrical success, and it places him definitely in the forefront of American play producers. The play opened in 1905, and was given its first tryout performance in the Belasco theatre in Pittsburgh. It was so popular that it was immediately taken into New York City, where it ran to capacity audiences during that and the following season. It then went on "the road," where it repeated its New York success. It is still considered one of the most popular plays of repertory companies. Practically every stock company of note has played it at one time or another. It served as a vehicle for increasing the fame of Blanche Bates, and made Frank Keenan, who took the role of Jack Rance, gambler and sheriff, one of America's outstanding character actors. Later the story was made into an opera, which, however, never attained the general popularity of the stage play. The opera served to call attention to the fact that American locales were just as colorful settings for operas as foreign locales. Others in the original stage cast included James Kirkwood, Lowell Sherman, Robert Willard, T. Haynes Hunter, John W. Cope and Horace James. Ann Harding plays Rennie, and Harry Bannister plays the leading roles in the new talking picture version.

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
