"Funny business is a serious proposition."

El Brendel, the famous Swedish character comedian, who has a leading role which is expected soon to elevate him to stardom in "Just Imagine," the new DeSylva, Brown and Henderson Fox Movietone success, is authority for the statement.

Brendel should know whereof he speaks. He is a veteran of the musical comedy and vaudeville stage and has been in pictures a year, arousing gales of laughter with his comic characterizations in "The Cock Eyed World," "They Had to See Paris," and especially in "Sunny Side Up," the first DeSylva, Brown and Henderson musical comedy made for the audible screen. Brendel's work in that triumph, which was also directed by David Butler, had much to do with making it the most popular picture of 1929.

"No two comedians," says Brendel, "can do a bit of comedy in exactly the same manner."

"Every successful comedian has imitators, but they never get very far. No one is going to duplicate Charlie Chaplin's comedy. They may dress and do some of his little tricks, but there is only one Chaplin."

"Laurel and Hardy have their own styles. So have Harold Lloyd and Harry Langdon. If I tried to imitate anyone, the results would be sad indeed. It also is fatal to let anyone suspect that you are trying to be funny."

"In my own work I try to do and say the natural, unthinking things which the character I usually portray would be likely to do and say in real life."

"Making people laugh is hard work usually. What will people laugh at? The other fellow's troubles, mostly, if they are not made to seem too serious."

In addition to Brendel, "Just Imagine," which comes to the Oasis Theatre, Friday and Saturday, includes Maureen O'Sullivan, John Garrick, Marjorie White and Frank Albertson.

APRIL 1 WHEAT STOCKS ON FARMS IN OREGON AND THE U.S.

In Oregon on April 1 there were 2,807,000 bushel of wheat remaining on farms, according to the esti-

mate of the Federal-State Crop Reporting Service. On April 1, 1930, wheat stocks were estimated at 2,025,000 bushel and on April 1, 1929, 1,865,000 bushel. The five year average is 1,803,000 bushel. A month ago, on March 1, Oregon farm stocks of wheat represented 18 per cent of the 1930 production com-

pared to the ten year average of 11 per cent. The unusually large March first stocks have been reduced by large disappearance from farms during March which was estimated at 1,402,000 bushel compared to 908,000 bushel last year and only 234,000 bushel in 1929.
